Steam Laundry, sel A Marcanti (20000)

We paid a visit to the Steam Laundry of Messrs. J. W. Macumber & Co., located on Nutt Street, next South of the Cape Fear Flour Mills, yesterday afternoop. The Laundry is destined to create a revolution in the washing business in this city. It is not in peration yet, but enough can be seen to give some idea of the modus operandi of the concern. There is connected with it a steam chest, a furnace and a drying chamber. The steam chest, in which the garments are washed, is supplied with pipes leading from the engine in the flour mill, which supplies it with water and steam. The garments are placed in the chest, which will contain about one hundred and fifty pieces of an average size, and the steam, which escapes from small holes in the pipes, causes the articles to revolve with such rapidity in the water that they soon become perfectly clean. The steam chest is of Dr. Macumber's own invention and is said to be perfectly adapted to the purpose. The clothes are then taken to the drying room in the second story. This room contains twelve clothes horses, with five slats to each, the who e arranged so as to form a perfect partition. Each of these horses is equal to seventy five feet of line, or nine hundred feet in all. This chamber is heated by the furnace on the lower floor, which also heats the irons. The operation of drying only takes about thirty minutes, when they are ready for the process of ironing. This is done entirely by hand. The Laundry will go into operation on Monday, when it will be worth the while of our citizens to call and gratify their curiosity by a personal inspection of this novel institution.
