There is nothing new to say about the yel low fever to day, except that only one death from that cause has taken place in three days. For the twenty-four hours ending at 12 M. yesterday no deaths of any kind were reported. There is some of the harmless, though painful, break-bone fever in the city, but a case of genuine yellow fever is as rare as an honest
