Probable Wholesale Poisoning.

In Faison's Township, Duplin county, on the 11th inst., a Mr. Exam Morris, aged about 73 years, was taken suddenly ill, complaining of a burning in the pit of the stomach. Remedies were applied, but without avail, and he died in a short time after being taken, . Two days afterwards, or on the 9th inst., his wife, Mrs. McKinnie Morris, was attacked in a similar manner, complaining of the same burning sensation in the stomach with which her husband had suffered, and in a very short time she had been laid beside her husband. On the 11th, or after the lapse of two more days, Ruth, an infant daughter of the above, aged eight months, was stricken in the same manner and died, and on the 13th, Charles, a son of the same family, was taken with the same disease and lived but a short time. Of course, suspicions were aroused among the neighbors that foul play had been used by some one, and immediate steps were taken to ascertain the truth of the matter. In pursuance of this object a Mr. Hodges, of Duplin, arrived in our city yesteruny with the stomachs of the two children with the purpose of submitting them to Dr. D. A. Bule for analysis. We learn that certain parties are suspicioned of perpetrating this wholesale slaughter, and it is hoped, if guilty, that they will speedily suffer the pen alties of the law.

Onr Cotton Trade.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the year ending Sept. 1st 1869, amounted to about 37,000 bales; for year ending Sept. 1st, 1870. 57,855 bales; and for year ending Sept. 1st, 1871, 92,100 bales. This is a most gratifying exhibit, and shows a steady increase in our cotton trade notwithstanding the cut-throat system of through freights. Indeed, for the cotton year just closed, our per centage of increase has been greater than that of New Orleans, Savannah, Mobile, Charleston or Gaveston, all of which out-rank Wilmington as cotton ports.

The high prices obtained for cotton here, the fair dealing and liberalty of our commission merchants, and the low prices of groceries, hardware and dry goods in this market, have all contributed to this undoubted evidence of our progress.

U. S. Circuit Court-The "Ku Klux" Trials, &c.

The court met at 10 o'clock, A. M. Judges Bond and Brooks presiding. The venire was then called, after which Mr. Phillips, Assistant U. S. District Attorney, announced that there was no case ready for trial, and the court dismissed the

jurors till 10 o'clock, A. M. to-morrow. Shortly after the dismissal of the jurors, U. S. Attorney General Akerman, who is here to prosecute on behalf of the government, entered the court and listened attentively to the argument in the case of James B. Stafford vs. E. J. Warren, President of the Senate, and Thos. J. Jarvis Speaker of the House of Representatives, et al., in the matter of the injunction to restrain them from appointing, and the appointees from serving as directors for the North Carolina railroad. The plaintiff was represented by Sam'l F. Phillips, Esq., and Judges Battle and Fowle appeared for the defendants. Judge Fowle opened the case and spoke about two hours. Mr. Phillips followed in reply till about 2 o'clock, when the court adjourned till 5 P. M., when Mr. Phillips will resume, and then Judge Battle will close. The questions involved are interesting, and the argument, substantially, will be reported in our next.
