The Circuit Court have refused the motion to quash the first and second counts in indictments against R. A. Justice, a member of the Legislature, from that county, and refusing to allow a challenge of the array.

The packing of the jury is a matter of public notoriety. The trial commenced regularly this morning, and has continued all day. The court is still in session at this time, 6:30 P. M.
