Spot on the Sun.

There is now a large, pear-shaped spot on that side of the sun that is turned toward us. It is about 40,000 miles in diameter, which is equivalent to three-quarters of a minute of arc; equal to the angle subtended by 131 inches at the distance of one mile from the eye. It is a very good test of the vision, through smoked glass, requiring an eyesight of a little more than the average penetration to see it without a magnifier. The spot is a little to the left, and about the same distance below the apparent centre of the solar disc.

Painful Accident.

A colored man by the name of Alexander Green, employed at the plantation of Dr. J. E. Winants, near this city, was engaged in cutting wood, on Tuesday afternoon, when his axe accidentally caught in the limb of a tree and in its descent came down upon his left foot, instead of the wood, nearly severing it into iwo parts. He was conveyed as soon as possible to the City Hospital, where he received the proper medical attention and at last accounts was doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances.


