The crop of 1871 is well known to be a partial failure—it being estimated by the most liberal and best posted dealers at not over one-third; but the immense stock of old corn that was held in Chicago prevented prices from materially advancing, although it was generally conceded that cing, although it was generally conceded that they would have been high anyhow later in the season, but now, since the destruction of about one fourth the entire stock in the United States, it is fair to presume we shall have the tallest prices for bloom corn known since the war
