Important Decision. As the United States District Court opens here next Monday, the following decision of Judge Brooks, which we take from the Newbern Times, will be read with interest:

"Judge Brooks on Wednesday, while delivering an opinion in relation to a motion made that a violator of a revenue law whose evidence had convicted another man, and who became a witness only upon the assurance given by some revenue officers that he would not be charged with, or tried for any offense, said that cases had come under his observation where revenue officers, for the purpose of causing men to violate the Internal Revenue Law, had entraped men by purchasing from them goods necessary to prove the violation of the law. His Honor said that, in his opinion, when a United States officer, for the purpose of trapping a man into a violation of the revenue law, purchased from him goods which he knew were sold in violation of the law, he becomes particeps criminis, and is not indictable should be."

"His Honor also held that where government officers use a person charged with a violation of the law, as a material witness, and when by his testimony he criminate himself it would be neither fair nor proper to indict or punish him."

"Col." Arnold. "Col." George M. Arnold (slightly color ed) late of this city, seems to be creating a sensation in Virginia. He is thus referred to in the Richmond Whig:

"Orator Arnold (colored) brings the State Journal bad news from Buckingham. He reports that the Hon. Frank Moss will be defeated for the Senate, on account of his advocacy of 'mixed schools.' Other accounts represent him as 'crazy' and going into the wilderness and holding converse with Angels, who assure him of re-election and a crown of glory."

"We have received a communication from George M. Arnold, the Radical colored 'orator' from North Carolina, contradicting the statement that he got away very quick from Buckingham county, fearing personal violence from 'Hon.' Frank Moss, the Radical hippopotamus. Arnold admits, however, that the meeting between Moss and himself was 'cool and distant.' He says:

"We simply exchanged the usual compliments of the day (very dry ones). In my speech, I used some very strong language against mixed schools. * * * Mr. Moss and I differ on some of the points, but I feared no personal violence from him.

"We think it was lucky for Arnold that Moss did not mount him. Had he done so, Arnold would scarcely have been able to exercise his lungs again during the canvass.

Accident. Last evening about 7 o'clock a horse and cart, belonging to Mr. E. C. Stanland, were crossing Honey Bridge, two colored men being in the cart at the time, it was run into by the Purcell House stage, and horse, cart and occupants were precipitated from the bridge to the railroad track below, a distance of some twenty feet. Neither of the men was injured; but the horse was so severely hurt that if it is supposed he will die, and the cart was completely demolished. The driver of the stage says he did not see the cart until he was upon it, while the men who were in the cart assert that they hailed loudly to the former to stop when they saw their safety was endangered.

A new bridge across the railroad at the point named, and stringent regulations in regard to vehicles crossing it, may avert a terrible accident; and we trust the city authorities will no longer neglect so important a matter.
