A proclamation has been issued by the President of the United States designating Thursday, the 30th of November, as Thanksgiving Day. The regular hop of the German Association takes place at Germania Hall to-morrow evening, and will doubtless be a pleasant affair in all respects.

We notice that a commodious shed is being erected on the site formerly occupied by the Messrs. Esory as a shipyard, on the West side of the Cape Fear. Several children were baptized at the Fifth Street Methodist Church, by the Pastor, on Sunday afternoon, Rev. Dr. Moran baptizing the child of the Rev. F. H. Wood.

We learn that some of the young ladies in this city have offered a tin cup as a special premium for the ugliest unmarried man who may be in attendance at the approaching Fair at this place. The annual session of the State Council Friends of Temperance commences in Franklinton on the 8th proximo. The meeting, it is said, will be the most important ever held by the organization in this State.

Mr. N. T. Harris informs us that he is the "gentleman in Wilmington," alluded to in Saturday's STAR as having "raised the plants and cured tea which, he claims, cannot be excelled in flavor by the imported article." Those complaining of the sawdusting of Seventh street should remember that that street is used principally by all funeral processions coming from the Southeastern portion of the city, and that as the city had the teams and probably paid little or nothing for the sawdust, the expense must have been trifling.

The Fall term of the U. S. District Court, His Honor, Judge Brooks, presiding, convened in this city yesterday, but, without transacting any business, adjourned until this morning. We learn that this action was in consequence of the fact that nineteen of the jurors composing the special venire were from Wayne county, which Judge Brooks, after a verbal examination, concluded was in the Pamlico Circuit. He therefore discharged the jurors alluded to, and ordered the Marshal to summon twenty others, and adjourned the Court.

The famous \$10,000 bond case will come up for trial this term. Mr. Hall, Agent of the owner of the bond, from whose office it is alleged to have been stolen, has arrived in the city and will be an important witness in the case.

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City Court. The following cases were disposed of yesterday: Eliza Harris, charged with drunkenness, curing, etc. Judgment suspended on the payment of costs.

Andrew Williams, charged with quarreling and being noisy and boisterous, was found guilty. Judgment suspended on payment of costs.

Thomas Gilmore, charged with quarreling, fighting, &c. Case continued over. Jerry Dunfield, charged with disorderly conduct, submitted and paid the penalty required.

Sam Kelly, charged with stealing a coat, was found guilty and sentenced to pay the penalty and costs. He was also required to give bond in the sum of \$200 for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court.

The Outlaws Again. A report came down on the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad, yesterday afternoon, to the effect that while Rev. James Sheslay, commonly known as the "Fighting Parson," was delivering an address at Seaford, North Carolina, on Saturday last, on the occasion of the opening of a school in that detestable locality, he was suddenly surrounded by Henry Berg Lowrey and his gang of outlaws, all armed to the teeth. As they are supposed, his eloquence was "nipped in the bud," and we learn indirectly, from one who was present, that the "Parson" was completely frightened out of his wits.
