In infancy he was dedicated to God in Holy Baptism at the solicitation of his pious mother, by Rev. Wm. Green, then a minister, and afterwards a Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church. Upon arriving at the years of accountability, he united in church fellowship with the church in which he had received Holy Baptism, and became a member of St. James' Parish, then under the pastoral supervision of Rev. R. B. Drane, D. D.

At the opening of the war, he was a member of a military organization known as the Wilmington Light Infantry, which was one of the first companies to offer its services to the State. Upon the re-organization of the company preparatory to the active part it was to take in the deadly struggle already commenced between the States, he was appointed to the peat of sergeant. He was afterwards promoted to a Lieutenancy and subsequently to the post of Capt. in the same company. He served throughout the entire war; was en-

He was most emphatically a christian gentleman. In social life, no husband was ever more affections of the social life, no husband was ever more affections. dowed with the characteristics of the hi type of a man. Selfishness, the bane of so formed so insignificant an element in his character that, but for respect to theological dogmas we would not hesitate to say that he was the very soul of generosity and benevolence. What he was willing to do for others' gratifiwhat he was willing to do for others' gratin-cation and welfare, was only limited by what he had to sacrifice. In the church no duty entrusted to him was neglected. The Sundays he gave to the cause of God with the same zeal that he exercised on other days, laboring for his employers. After much painful waiting he has been summoned to the enjoyment of the Eternal Sabbath above. His best record is on high. Until we are permitted to read it we can but imperfectly know how unspeakably worthy he was of our best love. His flesh rests in hope, his spirites with the Lord. May the mantle of his virtures fall on us who mourn him, and, like precious remembrances, be cherished of us when dead, J. H. D.
