BOOK NOTICES.

The Harpers announce, as ready for the trade, a most valuable compendium of Ancient History, entitled the Ancient History of the East. We have examined the work with some care, and unhesitatingly pronounce it a most valuable auxiliary to the student of History. Under the modest guise of a student's manual, it embodies an able and comprehensive digest of one of the most interesting and least studied periods of ancient history. To the conscientious student of classical literature—not merely the authors and text books of the ordinary curriculum, the value of a concise exposition of ancient Oriental civilizations does not require demonstration. As a work based upon independent investigation of the ancient writers, and a discreet employment of the best modern authorities, and as an excellent manual for the classical student and the general reader, we cordially commend this publication. Its author is Philip Smith, already known to the world of letters as the author of a meritorious "History of the World."

My Wife and I is the striking title of a new work of fiction from the pen of Mrs. Stowe. The work is gotten up in very attractive style, and we have little doubt, will have thousands of interested readers.
