THE FAIR. THIRD DAY

Large Crowd in Attendance.

The third day of the Fair of the Cape Fear Agricultural Association opened much more auspiciously than any of the preceding ones. Large numbers of visitors from various parts of the State, and more especially from the surrounding counties, came in on the trains Wednesday night, and in consequence the crowd on the grounds yesterday was much larger than on the previous day, the number being variously estimated at from 4,000 to 6,000 persons. The grounds thronghout the day wors a very annimated appearance, and the various Halls were constantly crowded with ladles and others examining the various articles so temptingly displayed in the different depart-

At 11 o'clock the exhibition of stock on the track took place.

At 12 o'clock the annual address was delivered by Hon. A. M. Waddell, of this city. We had intended to publish the able effort of our distinguished fellow-citizen in full, but for certain causes over which we had no control we have been denied the privilege. Suffice It to say that it was in every way worthy of the man and that he fully sustained his reputation as an able champion of his State and section. He was particular to impress upon his fellowcitizens the imperative duty of properly appreciating the responsibility which they are under to their own particular section, and the importance of fostering everything calculated to advance its material prosperity. He deprecateu, especially, the idea of looking, too much to outside help for the promotion of our intersis in this direction, and anvised his audience to go to work manfully in building up the waste places and starting our State on a new

FLORAL HALL.
