Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta Railroad.
Alluding to the presence of Hon. R. K. Bridges, President, and D. A. Newcomer, Vice President, of the Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta Railroad, in that city a few days since, the Augusta Chronicle and Sentinel remarks: "For some time past this company has been engaged in the construction of a railroad between Sumter and Columbia. It lacks now only about 700 feet of completion, and this gap will be filled in a few days. On the 10th of December the company expects to open the new line for the transaction of business. It was originally intended to build this road through to Augusta from Columbia, and the route between the two cities was surveyed, but a policy was adopted which rendered this unnecessary. Several months ago the controllers of the company bought enough of the stock of the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Railroad to give them control of that corporation, and the lines from here to Columbia and from Columbia to Wilmington will be operated as one."

Legislative Session.
The Legislature convened at Raleigh on Monday. In the Senate the roll was called and a quorum found to be present. The usual formalities were gone through with, when Mr. Robbins, of Rowan, introduced a bill entitled "An act to alter the Constitution of North Carolina."
Ordered to be printed and made the special order for Tuesday at 4 o'clock.
Mr. Robbins, of Rowan, moved that a message be sent to the House proposing to raise a joint select committee on constitutional reform. Adopted.
The Senate met at 12 o'clock, when Mr. Speaker Jarvis delivered an able address, after which there being no general proposition an adjournment was had.

—A correspondent of the Charlotte Democrat, writing from Wilkesboro, Wilkes county, says: A sad occurrence happened in this county the first of last week. Mr. Constant Gray and sons, Wm. Mathis and others had been engaged in a fox chase, and after returning to a neighbor's house some dispute took place between young Gray and Wm. Mathis, when they got into an affray. While thus engaged the father, Constant Gray, ran up and cut the throat of Mathis, from which he died in a short time. Gray escaped arrest, but two days afterwards, in the presence, I learn, of his son and brother, cut his own throat and bled to death in a few hours. Both men were almost giants in size and strength, and although very wild were very respectable men.
