Probabilities.

**Arrests for Alleged Violations of the Internal Revenue Law.**  
We learn that Mr. R. W. Berry, who is Commissioner of Internal Revenue for the Raleigh District, and whose arrival in this city we noticed in yesterday's paper, arrested eight citizens of this place and bound them over for appearance at the next term of the U. S. District Court for alleged violations of the Internal Revenue law. We believe that it is the bounden duty of all good citizens to respect and obey the laws of the country and that a wholesome punishment is absolutely necessary for those who willfully disregard or refuse to observe them; but in this instance we think that, if there has been any violation at all, it has been more through ignorance of what is really required of the parties than from any intention or desire on their part to evade or disregard the law. We think, and many others are of the same opinion, that the officials themselves have fallen short of their duty in the premises in not giving sufficient publicity to the provisions of the revenue laws and the penalties for a violation of the same. Let them discharge their duty in this respect, by properly informing the business communities of their duties and obligations to the government in the premises, and we venture to predict that Revenue officials will find very little cause for complaint in Wilmington.

By the way, we learn that a Detective, by the name of Berry, was sent here from Raleigh last week, and it is due to his instrumentality that the arrests alluded to have been made.

### LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.

(Condensed from the Raleigh Sentinel.)  
SENATE,  
THURSDAY, NOV. 23.  
The Senate met at 11 A. M., President Warren in the chair.  
Mr. Graham, of Orange, presented the memorial of H. F. C. Wilson, of Baltimore, Md., a holder of bonds of the State worth the amount of nearly twenty thousand dollars, which he proposes to compromise for less than twelve thousand, on the basis of sixty cents on the dollar for bonds purchased before the war, and forty cents for those purchased in 1866-68.  
Mr. Graham hoped this petition would receive respectful consideration, it being the first offer on the part of creditors to compromise with the State. He moved the memorial be referred to the committee on finance with instruction to report by bill or otherwise.

Mr. Linsey introduced a bill to be entitled "An act to allow a mortgage deposit in lieu of personal security in civil cases." Referred.  
Mr. Olds, a bill in relation to the inspection of fish. [Proposes to require
