—There will be an Emergency meeting of Wilmington Council No. 4, to-morrow evening, at 7 o'clock.
—The Drug Store of Messrs. Mebane and James, corner of Front and Princess streets, will open to-day.
—We learn that snow fell in Fayetteville on Thursday night and Friday morning last to the depth of about five inches.
—Dan Rice's circus is to be in Raleigh on the 11th inst. We hope Dan may find it convenient to pay Wilmington a visit.
—The Northern Exposition joins in the appeal to the Legislature for a reduction of the tax on theatrical performances, concerts, &c.
—The Tremaine Brothers left here yesterday morning for Wilson; from there they go to Raleigh and from there to New York.
—The Rev. Thomas Whaley, of Virginia, will preach in the First Presbyterian Church to-day (Sunday) at 10 1/2 o'clock A. M. and 7 1/2 P. M.
—We are requested to state that the Grand United Order of Odd Fellows (colored) will have a service in the City Hall on Wednesday night next.
—We learn from the City Clerk and Treasurer that there will be a public sale, at auction, to-morrow at 12 o'clock M., for city taxes of delinquents for 1870.
—Thanks to Mr. R. L. Harris for copies of the *N. Y. Ledger* and *Chimney Corner* for the current week. Persons in want of late paper of all kinds should call at his stand on Front street.
—The Fifth Street Methodist Episcopal Church was illumined with gas, yesterday evening, for the first time. This is a great improvement on the kerosene lamps heretofore used.
—From the report of W. H. Bradley, Clerk of the Market, we learn that the various butchers of this city slaughtered, during the month of November, 295 beefs, 531 hogs, 103 sheep, 10 calves and 10 deer.
—Messrs. James & Meares, auctioneers, advertise that they will sell a horse and buggy at auction to-morrow, at 12 o'clock, in front of the City Hall. They will also sell the city property for taxes, alluded to elsewhere.
—A colored man by the name of Jas. Harris, having indulged his appetite for "bendins" to an extent beyond his capacity for such "beverages," and being engaged, also, in the sport of robbing a brother freedman's house, was arrested by the police, yesterday afternoon, and lodged in the Guard House.

Superior Court.

The December term of the Superior Court for New Hanover county will convene in this city to-morrow, His Honor, Judge Russell, presiding. We learn that none but criminal cases will be tried during this term. The bill before the Legislature, heretofore alluded to, which provides for four terms of two weeks each, the first to commence on the 4th Monday in January, we understand, been so amended as to allow the holding of the present term. The January term, provided for in the new bill, will, we learn, be devoted exclusively to the trial of civil cases. This is very proper under the circumstances, as it will ensure the clearing of the civil docket of all the old cases.

Meteorological.

From Sergeant Robert Seaboth, of the Signal Service in this city, we have a report showing the daily and monthly mean of Barometer and Thermometer, monthly velocity of wind and amount of rainfall, with the prevailing direction of the wind, for the month of November, 1871. The report shows the monthly average of Barometer to have been 30.07 inches, and of Thermometer 55.1 degrees. Total rainfall for the month, 4.46 inches. Prevailing wind, North and North East. Total number of miles traveled, 3,198 miles.

Robbery.

Some thief entered the store of Mr. Claus Shriver, on Fourth, between Bladen and Hargett streets, on Friday night last, and relieved the money drawer of what change it contained, amounting in all to about twelve dollars and fifty cents. At the time the robbery was committed Mr. Shriver was near the fire-place talking with some friends, the thief in the meantime entering the door, creeping behind the counter and securing the money, with which he beat a hasty retreat. The perpetrator of the theft has not yet been arrested.

A Collision.

Yesterday afternoon, as the Norwegian Barge *Demakab*, Capt. John Hanson, was about leaving the railroad wharf on the west side of the river, in tow of the steamer *Waccamaw*, an accidently came in collision with one of Mr. Orrell's flats, on which was about forty one barrels of rosin. The flat was sunk and five barrels of the rosin lost. We learn that Mr. Orrell estimates his loss from the accident at from \$250 to \$300.

It is proposed to make the building sufficiently large to accommodate five hundred patients—just double the number now in.
