NOON REPORTS.

From New York. NEW YORK, Dec. 15. A private letter from Havana says it is believed that the late Governor Roberts, brother of the Spanish Minister at Washington, caused the arrest of the students for the purpose of extorting money from their parents and unexpectedly found himself unable to control the Spanish mob.

The committee of the Clearing House report the National Bank of the Commonwealth solvent. The Police Commissioners have rescinded the order forbidding the Internationalists procession next Sunday. A meeting of the Internationalists last night adopted an address, which says "the cause of the working classes, who always fought for the liberties of the oppressed, is the cause of Internationalism. The resolutions declare sympathy with the Cubans and denounce the attitude of the Grant administration upon the Cuban question."

A meeting of doctors was held yesterday to take steps to secure legislative enactments against quackery and abortion. The Sheriff has seized the New York Printing Company's establishment and the New York Stationers Manufacturing Office, for one hundred thousand dollars of protested notes in the Ocean Bank.

From South Carolina. COLUMBIA, Dec. 15. In the Ku Klux trial today, the Court was chiefly occupied in hearing witnesses for the defense, who testified to the alarm and excitement at all classes in York county, caused by the organization of the negro militia. The Grand Jury found true bills today against several more of the alleged conspirators of York county.

Foreign News. LONDON, Dec. 15-5 A. M. The Prince of Wales is decidedly better, and takes food, with strength increasing. There are hopes of continued progress toward recovery. Crowds are gathered at the news centres and cheer the favorable bulletins heartily. The Times contradicts the report of Schenck's recall. Nearly all the striking telegraphers have resumed work. P. M.—The prospects of the Prince of Wales' recovery is hourly growing better. There is increased weakness, but it is believed the fever has spent its force. With increased quiet the patient is gaining strength. P. M.—The summons of Princess Victoria to Sandringham from Berlin has been countermanded. The extreme ritualists' refusal to pray for the Prince of Wales probably without an order from their bishop causes a sensation. Lady Burgoyne, wife of Field Marshal Burgoyne, is dead.

SANDRINGHAM, Dec. 15.—Noon. The Prince of Wales continues tranquil and slowly but gradually improves.

UK NIGHT REPORTS. FROM WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, Dec. 15. MISCELLANEOUS. Mr. Eiss, the new Fifth Auditor, assumed the duties of that position today. There was a full meeting of the Cabinet this morning. The war steamer Wabash has arrived safely at Cadiz—all well. The Republican Senate caucused this morning and agreed to order the thorough examination of the departments and branches of the public service. The committee consists of Buckingham, How, Pratt, Harlan, Stewart, Pool, and Bayard.

CONGRESSIONAL. HOUSE.—A petition was presented from New York and Boston merchants for a reduction of the tax on rice. A bill appropriating \$4,000,000 for astute and public buildings at Chicago, was passed, and the House adjourned to Monday.

From Maryland. ANNAPOLIS, Dec. 15. In the course of the trial today, a son of Gen. Ketchum testified to Mrs. Wharton's conversation with different parties, at different times, regarding money transactions, and they agree, but are not in accord with Ketchum's statements to his son.

From Georgia. AUGUSTA, Dec. 15. The Mississippi Central Railroad was protested here today in bonds due at Atlanta last. The road is leased to the Southern Railroad Association, but both failed to provide the funds necessary to avoid a protest of their matured and overdue notes.

From South Carolina. COLUMBIA, Dec. 15. In the Ku Klux trial today, the defense was engaged in proving by many witnesses the terror existing among the whites in the up country at the time of the alleged outrages. The testimony showed that Jim Williams, the negro captain of militia, had threatened to slay the whites from the cradle up and to apply the torch. William Bratten, colored, testified that he was a lieutenant in Williams' company and was reduced to the ranks on account of his dissent from Williams' violent measures. The defense asked further time to bring witnesses to show that the Ku Klux was organized for self protection and had ceased to exist of itself.

From Pennsylvania. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 15. John Ware was hung at Camden today for the murder of his father. NEW YORK, Dec. 15. The Jersey City postoffice was robbed of \$2,000 in money and \$300 in postage stamps last night. Eight children were taken from the Brooklyn Orphan Asylum in the smallpox hospital today. The smallpox is decreasing here.

From Massachusetts. BOSTON, Dec. 15. Charles Miller, of the firm of Miller, Ward & Co., sentenced in 1868 to 5 years in the penitentiary and \$100,000 fine for defrauding the government, has been pardoned and the fine remitted.

From California. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 15. The body of a drowned man washed ashore at Balboa Bay with a life preserver marked "Corcoran, of Thomaston." The Bark Corcoran sailed from Australia on the 20th November.

CABLE DISPATCHES. LONDON, Dec. 15. The following is the latest from Sandringham: "5:30 P. M.—The Prince was more tranquil all the evening. The course of the fever continues favorable. The Queen will return to Windsor to-morrow."

From Alabama. MONTGOMERY, Dec. 15. Both branches of the Alabama Legislature

have resolved to extend the session beyond 30 days. A bill has passed both houses authorizing the Governor to issue Alabama eight per cent. bonds to the amount of one million dollars to be used as necessary may require.

From Virginia. RICHMOND, Dec. 15. It has been snowing heavily for seven hours and still continues. The snow is nine to ten inches deep. Suring, who was shot yesterday by Monteiro, was so much better this morning that there are hopes of his recovery. Monteiro has been killed in the sum of \$5,000.
