The receipts at all ports for the week were 120,918 against 150,830 bales last week, 122,126 bales the previous week, and 104,740 bales three weeks since. The total receipts since September 1,1871, have been 1,118,557 against 1,372,557 bales for the corresponding period of the previous year—showing a decrease of 254,010 bales.

The exports from all ports for the week were 107,473 against 117,598 bales for the same week last year. The total exports for the expired portion of the year have been 592,609 against 755,168 bales for the same time last year. The stock at all interior towns is 71,435 against 104,346 last year. The stock in Liverpool is 458,000 against 385,000 last year. The stock at all ports is 406,422 against 468,256 for

the same time last year.


