INTERESTING CEREMONY.

Laying of the Corner Stone of the New Building for the College of Physicians and Surgeons - A Large Crowd Present - Impressive Ceremonies - The Address of Prof. Noble Young - The Collection, &c.

The ceremony of laying the corner stone of the new building now in course of completion by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of this city, designed for a Dispensary and Primary School of Medicine, located on Third, between Princess and Chesnut streets, took place yesterday morning, in the presence of a large number of ladies and gentlemen, who had been attracted to the scene.

The truly impressive and interesting ceremony was performed under the auspices of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of North Carolina, the following gentlemen acting as Grand officers pro tem: P. G. M. Alfred Martin, Grand Master.

H. H. Munson, Deputy Grand Master. T. M. Gardner, Grand Senior Warden. T. H. Johnson, Grand Junior Warden. Fred. G. Robinson, Grand Treasurer. Wm. M. Poisson, Grand Secretary.

J. L. Cantwell, Grand Marshal. J. S. Everett, W. R. Kennan, A. David, J. F. Heins, Rev. Geo. Patterson, Grand Chaplain. G. W. Sealey, Grand Tyler.

The procession, consisting of the Grand Lodge and St. John's Lodge No. 1, was formed on Market street, in front of St. John's Hall, and preceded by the Rose Bud Brass Band, marched up Market to Third street and thence to the grounds. After assuming proper positions in and around the platform, were commenced by P. G. M. Alfred Martin, who delivered a short but very impressive address, after which the choir of the Lodge, under the direction of Past Master J. C. Mann, with Prof. Grabau at the organ, rendered a beautiful and appropriate Masonic Ode, which was followed by Prayer by the Grand Chaplain.

THE CORNER STONE. Upon which was the following inscription - Non nobis solum, sed toti mundo nati - which, translated, is "Not born for ourselves alone, but for the whole world," was then placed in position. In the cavity was the following list of articles: The Holy Bible. A specimen of coin. A list of the officers of the State, City and County. Names of Churches and their Pastors. Seal of the College - "In God we trust." Inaugural Address of its President. List of officers and members of St. John's Lodge.

Proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Masons in laying the stone. The square, level and plumb having been applied by the D. G. M., G. S. and G. J. Wardens, the corn, wine and oil was then poured out upon the stone with appropriate and beautiful sentiments. The ceremonies here being concluded, the Masons marched in due order, accompanied by the members of the College and the large number of ladies and gentlemen in attendance, to the City Hall opposite, and the audience assembled.

IN THE THEATRE. Upon the stage was seated the orator of the occasion, surrounded by the members of the College, viz: Dr. J. Francis King, President; W. W. Linn, Secretary; B. F. Cobb, Treasurer; H. S. Norcom, S. S. Satchell, W. F. Love and T. B. Carr, also Hon. B. N. Martin, Mayor of the city, and the officers of the Masonic Lodge, including the choir. After the singing of an appropriate ode by the choir, Prof. Young was introduced to the audience by the President, Dr. King.

THE ADDRESS. The speaker (as we learn from a gentleman who was kind enough to furnish us with this brief synopsis of his speech) then proceeded to deliver a highly interesting, able and appropriate address, which, though chiefly and mainly addressed to the members of the College, was very entertaining to his non-professional hearers, and well received by the appreciative audience who honored the occasion with their presence and approbation. His main subject was the history of the medical profession of the United States, together with the progress and achievement of medical instruction. He complimented the College for the enterprise shown in their pioneer work of public medical education in North Carolina, and urged their devotion to the organization of hospital advantages and clerical instruction in connection with their new institution, which has just been chartered by the Legislature with the foregoing names of well known physicians in our midst as its originators and managers. He expected these enterprising medical gentlemen to be firm, patient and faithful in carrying out the noble project in which they have so auspiciously commenced, and appealed to the community to encourage and sustain them.

The whole address was marked by much professional devotion and ability, and by high-toned professional esprit de corps. The Prof. has made a most favorable impression, both with his professional brethren and all those who had the pleasure of listening to an address of which this is but an imperfect and inadequate notice. It will, however, soon be published, when all who were deprived of the opportunity of listening to it may have the opportunity of reading it in print.

The Doxology was then sung and the Benediction pronounced, after which the Masonic fraternity, the College of Physicians and Surgeons, the Mayor of the city and a few invited guests repaired to the Court room in the City Hall, where

was experienced, appropriate toasts being interchanged and much good feeling manifested, after which the Masonic fraternity formed in procession and returned to their Lodge room. A COLLATION. Subsequently the members of the College, together with the Orator of the day and a few invited guests partook of a collation at the residence of President King, on Third street.
