Arrest of a Counterfeiter. Hearing a great hue and cry on North Water street last night, about 8 o'clock, we hastened to ascertain the cause of it, when we were furnished with the following particulars: A white man of very respectable appearance, being well dressed and polite and affable in his manners, entered the saloon of Mr. W. T. Daniels, near the corner of Market and North Water streets, and called for a cigar, receiving which he offered in payment a \$5 bill. Upon being asked if he had nothing smaller, he displayed a roll of bills, all of which were of the same denomination, and stated that it was the best he could do. Mr. R. F. Eyden, who received the money, gave him the change and he walked out. He had barely got clear of the door, however, before Mr. Eyden discovered that the bill was counterfeit and started in immediate pursuit of his late customer, whom he detected a few minutes afterward coming out of Mr. D. J. Gilbert's saloon on South Water street, where he had passed another of the spurious bills. Mr. E. informed him that the bill he had received was a counterfeit, upon which the man offered to exchange it for another. This Mr. E. refused to accede to until he could get to the saloon, where there was a light, and keeping a watch on his customer they proceeded to Mr. Daniels' saloon. Upon entering, Mr. Eyden asked Mr. Daniels to call a policeman, while he closed the door on his prisoner. The latter in the meantime offered Mr. E. \$10 to let him go, and upon that being refused, he proposed to increase the sum to \$50, appealing to Mr. E. "not to get him in a scrape."

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Laying the Corner Stone of Giblem Lodge.

The corner stone of Giblem Lodge No. 2, F. & A. A. Y. M., now in course of erection at the corner of Eighth and Princess streets, was laid yesterday.

The ceremonies were conducted by Grand Master J. W. Hood, assisted by Wm. McLaurin, Deputy Grand Master, Robert Simmons, S. W. James W. Telfair, J. W., and Geo. W. Price, Sr., G. C. The exercises were commenced by the singing of an Ode by the choir, after which prayer was offered by Grand Chaplain G. W. The ceremonies here having been concluded, the procession re-formed and marched up Eighth street to Chesnut, down Chesnut to Fourth, down Fourth to Market, down Market to Front, up Front to Walnut and up Walnut to the Lodge room.
