

New Through Freight Tariff.

We have before us a new through freight tariff, just issued by Col. A. Pope, General Freight Agent of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, showing the rates of freight between this city and points on the North Carolina Railroad, which went into effect on the 18th inst. From an examination of the schedule, we find that there has been a considerable reduction on the old tariff, which actually amounted to a prohibition, so far as trade between this city and the West was concerned. 


