LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.

[Condensed from the Raleigh Carolinian.]

SENATE. WEDNESDAY, Jan. 3.

The Senate met at the usual hour, Mr. President Warren in the chair. Mr. Dargan asked and obtained leave to record his vote on the bill to alter the Constitution. He voted ave.

BILLS ON SECOND READING. Mr. Dargan introduced a bill to amend the bastarday act. Gives Justices of the Peace original jurisdiction, and declares bastardy a misdemeanor. Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

A bill to amend the act prescribing salaries and fees, so as to allow only sixty cents for executing summons and complaint, being on its second reading, and adversely reported upon it was, on motion of Mr. Cowles, laid on the table.

Bill to enable the W., C. and R. R. Co. to extend its road to the Tennessee line, being on its second reading, it was, on motion of Mr. Whitesides, made the special order for Friday next, at 12 o'clock. The bill to confer cumulative suffrage upon the voters of the city of Wilmington coming up, it was, on motion of Mr. Brogden, postponed until Monday next.

Bill to repeal chapter 227, Laws of 1869 '70, in regard to the taking of depositions, re enacting the provisions of the Revised Code on the subject, being on its third reading, it was, on motion of Mr. Gilmer, amended so as to make it clear that there was no change in the mode of taking the deposition of non-residents.

As amended, it passed its third reading. On motion of Mr. Flemming, the rules were suspended in order to take up the bill in relation to extending the time for collecting and settling county taxes, as amended by the Committee on Propositions and Grievances. No quorum voting, the roll was called, when twenty-six Senators answered, including the presiding officer. Passed-yeas, 16; nays, 10.

Bill to incorporate the Wilson Building and Loan Association, passed its second

The amendment of the House to the joint resolution of inquiry into the lease of the N. C. R. R. to the Richmond and Danville Railroad, transmitted as aboveamendment substituting a member of the House for the Fraud Commission, to investigate the matter of the lease of the road gave rise to considerable discus-

Mr. Graham, of Orange, was opposed to concurring in the amendment. Mr. Gilmer favored concurrence.

THE SPECIAL ORDER

was postponed until 11 A. M. Friday. The consideration of the House amendment to the joint resolution of inquiry was

Messrs. Worth, Flemming and Graham, of Orange, occupied the same ground taken by them when the resolution passed the Senate. While Mr. Graham could not approve of the lease, believing that it was not the best that could have been done for the State, he paid a compliment to the present management of the road.

Mr. Brown thought investigation was due to both the State and the lessee. He spoke in glowing terms of the energy of the Pennsylvania Central Railroad Company. A few years ago it was comparatively a weak corporation; now, it has its lines in all directions—the result of business tact.

Mr. Brogden thought the Legislature competent to investigate the matter. Besides economy was to be taken into consideration. As regarded dividends, Mr. Brogden said that the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, one of the best managed in the country, had paid none since the war. He thought the lease would prove satisfactory to all, and endorsed the sentiment of the Senator from Caswell, that we should look forward to its result. Mr. Gilmer moved that the Senate agree

Mr. Worth moved to enlarge the committee suggested in said amendment, by making the number five, three on the part of the House, and two on the part of the Senate; on which motion not a quorum

voted. The Senate then adjourned until seven o'clock, P. M.

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
