THE UNIVERSITY.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University, the President, who is Gov. Caldwell ex-officio, was authorized to appoint a committee of three to ascertain and report, 1st, what the amount of the University debt is to whom due, and what terms of compromise can be obtained; 2nd, the condition and place of all the property and funds of the University. The same committee are authorized and requested to confer with the Alumni and invoke their aid in behalf of the University.

In pursuance of this action of the Board, the Governor appointed Alexander McIver, W. B. Rodman and R. F. Lehman—all members of the Radical party, as a committee to carry out the purposes of the resolution.

The Alumni of the old University are requested to meet on Thursday, the first of February, in Raleigh, to advise together and concert measures for the relief of the University and probably also to take steps for its speedy restoration.

This is a matter in which every Alumnus should feel a personal interest, and in behalf of which he should be willing to make even a sacrifice. The lifting from the dust and placing again on her throne of our honored University is a labor of love as well as of duty.

Patrick Henry in the House of Burgesses.

Only three days of the session remained. On the blank leaf of an old "Coke upon Lyttleton"—perhaps Jefferson's own copy—the new member wrote his celebrated five resolutions, of this purport: We, Englishmen living in America, have all the rights of Englishmen living in England; the chief of which is, that we can only be taxed by our own representatives; and any attempt to tax us otherwise menaces British liberty on both continents. In all probability Jefferson knew that something of the kind was intended on that memorable day, for he was present in the House. There was no gallery then, nor any other provision for spectators; but there could be no objection to the friends and relative of so many members standing in the doorway and there he took his stand. He saw his tall, gaunt, coarsely-stripped guest rise, in his awkward way, and break with stammering tongue the silence which had brooded over the session had passed. He observed, and felt too, the thrill which ran through the House at the mere introduction of a subject with which every mind was surcharged, and marked the rising tide of feeling as the reading of the resolutions went on, until the climax of audacity was reached in the last clause of the last.

How moderate, how tame, the words seem to us! "Every attempt to invest such power (of taxation) in any person or persons whatever other than the General Assembly aforesaid has a manifest tendency to destroy British and American freedom." Ravishing words to the Whig members from Albermarle and the other western counties. Sound as old Coke himself, in the judgment of our spell-bound listener in the doorway. Words of fearful import to the Tory lords of the eastern counties. Not approved as yet by Gen. Wythe nor by Peyton Randolph, whom the student held in so much honor.

When the reading was finished he heard his friend utter the opening sentences of his speech with faltering tongue, as usual, and giving little promise of the strains that were to follow. But it was the nature of this great genius to rise to the occasion. Soon Jefferson saw him stand erect, and swinging free of all impediments, launch into the tide of his oration, every eye captivated by the large and sweeping grace of his gesticulation; every ear charmed by the swelling music of his voice; every mind thrilled or stung by the vivid epithets into which he condensed his opinions. He never had a listener so formed to be held by him as the student at the lobby door, who, as a boy, had found the oratory of the Indian chief so impressive, and could not now resist a stirring translation of Osian's majestic phrases. After the lapse of fifty-nine years, he spoke of this great day with enthusiasm, and described anew the closing moments of Henry's speech, whom the orator, interrupted by the cries of treason, uttered the well-known words of defiance, "If this be treason, make the most of it!"

Trade Reviving in New York. A New York correspondent writes: "The continuance of fine weather is having a very favorable effect upon general business. In some of the leading departments of wholesale trade there is an activity not wholly noticeable so early in the season. Merchants from Louisville, New Orleans, Galveston, and other remote points, are here in considerable numbers, while Savannah and Charleston houses are beginning to put in an appearance. The Cincinnati and St. Louis people are expected all in the course of next week. On all hands the anticipations are in favor of an unusually brisk spring trade commencing earlier than has been the rule of late years."

A 12 ton gun, worth \$30,000, was recently lost in Bombay harbor. The Jumna, a short time ago, took out from England six new 12 ton guns for the protection of the harbor. As soon as the ship was ready for unloading, suitable tackle was obtained, and a boat came alongside the Jumna. When the first cannon was lowered into the boat, it almost sank her. To save the boatmen, the order was given to rebait. The boat happily pulled off a little, for the slings intended for lowering proved insufficient for raising the mass of metal, and gave way. There was one tremendous splash, and the last was seen of the 12 ton gun. Divers could find no other trace of it than a sort of dimple in the mud, where it disappeared. They probed as deep, as a doctor would for a bullet, but with no success; and, considering the nature of the harbor bottom, some 38 feet of mud in parts, it is tolerably certain that this lost treasure will rest in its present bed for many centuries.
