After many years of successful running of the gauntlet of criticism, during which its popularity has often appeared to be endangered by the crude personations of the thousands U. S. A , was expected to arrive in this city of pretentions aspirants who have essayed its prominent roles, this beautiful drama still maintains its hold upon the sympathies of the public. Though undoubtedly its merit is chilefly rhetorical, the animated action, sparkling dialogue and elever intrigue of the Lady of Lyons have combined, with its wondrously captivating rhetorical beauties, to give it a very high place among the acting dramas of the last quarter of a century.

In dramatic nomenclature it is classed as a play, a term designating a creation differing in essential particulars from tragedy, comedy or melodrama. Yet all the great tragic lights of the stage have appeared anxious to excel in the personation of Claude Melnotte, and there are few prominent lady members of the profession who have not often essayed Phuline. Within the memory of the present generation, Edwin Forrest embraced Claude in his repertoire. Edwin Booth does not disdain to exchange the adulation, which his genius in Hamlet challenges from the public, for the rapturous plaudits which always greet his appearance as Bulwer's hero, and 'only a twelvemonths since the spinsters of Boston went mad over the unctuous love-making of Fechter as Claude Melnotte.

As a drama, a term which, in its just usage, implies something more than rhetorical splendor, the Lady of Lyons is certainly inferior to Bulwer's Richelieu, and we think vastly inferior to Money, the exquisite comedy by the same author. Compar. d with either of these productions it is deficient in characterization -an indispensable feature in a drama aspiring to high rank, and wants very much, even in its principal characters, a vigorous, robust, high-souled individuality. 



Street Improvements. The city authorities have had an estimate made of the planking of Nutt street from Mulberry street to the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford railroad depot. It will cost about \$2,000 to lay a plank road twenty feet wide the whole distance. We are informed that if the two railroads will bear half the expense the city and the citizens living along the line proposed to be improved will bear the balance of the cost

This street, leading as it does to the railroad depots, is the most important thoroughfare in the city, and one in which every business man is interested; therefore it is an exception to the general rule adopted regarding improvements on streets, and the cost ought to be borne by all classes of citizens. Every drayman is interested and every citizen is more or less dependent upon the condition of the street for the price of drayage to and from the depot. A good road would lessen the price of drayage and thereby benefit everybody.
