At the thirty-second monthly meeting of the Wilmington Building Association, held at the Commercial Exchange last evening, 20 shares of stock were redeemed at \$119 per share.

The Use of Kerosene Oil.

So arranged it is impossible for the lamp to explode.

Death from Burning.—Inquest.
Maria Damon, the colored woman who was so severely burned on Monday morning last, near the Poor House, by her clothing accidentally catching fire, died on Tuesday night. Yesterday, Coroner Hewlett submitted a jury and held an inquest over the body, the verdict being in accordance with the facts already detailed by us.

City Court.
The following cases were disposed of yesterday morning:

A white woman charged with retelling without license, was required to pay the penalty and costs.

Daniel Bell, charged with obtaining goods under false pretenses from George Hart, was found guilty, but judgment suspended on the payment of costs.

Edward Brice, of the British Brig *Anson*, charged with desertion, was discharged at the cost of the prosecution.

Five cases were continued over for a future hearing.

More Deserters.
Yesterday morning, about 5 o'clock, two seamen belonging to the bark *Willy and Emory*, which was lying on the opposite side of the river, took one of the boats belonging to the vessel and made their escape, coming to this side of the river. The boat was subsequently discovered by Capt. Ben. Beery in the possession of two colored men, who were rowing past the shipyard on the opposite side of the river, and knowing it to belong to the bark he hailed them and told them to bring it ashore, which they did, and it was restored to the vessel. At last accounts the two men were at large. Desertions from vessels in this port are becoming exceedingly frequent.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

Extracts from the Proceedings.
At an adjourned meeting of the Board, held on Tuesday night, the following among other business was transacted:

Capt. E. J. Pennypacker submitted a proposition to extend the lien on Theatre for four years from Oct. 1st, 1872, at an annual rental of \$500, payable quarterly. In addition he proposes to expend a sufficient amount to renew the scenery, to provide additional stage furniture, upholstery, &c., and have all repairs that may be required done at his own expense. Received and adopted as to price and conditions.

Ordinance passed authorizing the City Treasurer to deposit the money or monies of the city in the Bank of New Hanover.

The Mayor was authorized to appoint a suitable number of persons, not to exceed three, to list the taxes, for which service they are to be allowed \$3 per day.

A communication from Perry M. Rice, chief engineer, asking for 3,000 feet additional leading hose for use in the fire department, was referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

A petition of sundry citizens asking for certain improvements north of the Wilmington and Weldon railroad, was referred to the Aldermen of the First Ward, together with the City Marshal, with power to act.

Petition of Henry Savage for permission to erect a frame building with its roof on his lot was granted.

F. Mariens was granted a recommendation for license to retail spirituous liquors.

The Committee on Hospital reported that this institution has been kept satisfactory during the past year, and recommended that a contract be entered into with Dr. J. E. Winstons for the year beginning with March 1st, 1872, and ending with March 1st, 1873, at the rate of 25 cents per diem for each patient. Mayor authorized to conclude the contract.
