The barometer will probably continue rising on Tuesday, with clear weather and northerly winds from Pennsylvania to Maine, but gradually stationary or falling, with easterly winds and increasing cloudiness from the upper lakes to the south Atlantic and Gulf coasts; the low barometer in Kansas continues, extending east and northeast, with threatening rain and possibly rain from Arkansas to Illinois; southeasterly winds prevail on the Gulf coast.

Dangerous winds are not anticipated for Monday night other than the northwest winds in New England.

PASSED AWAY.

Another of our old citizens has passed through the Dark Valley and now rests from his labors. On Sunday morning last, about 6 1/2 o'clock, after a short illness, our esteemed fellow citizen, Alfred L. Fenton, departed this life. Mr. Fenton's long connection with the newspaper business made his name familiar throughout the length and breadth of the State. He was born on Bath Creek, Beaufort county, N. C., on the 13th day of November, 1815, being at the time of his death in the 57th year of his age. He was early apprenticed to the printing business, serving at least a portion of his time in Washington, N. C. The year 1842, however, found him at work as a journeyman in the city of New York. But his stay there was not very protracted, as, not long afterwards, we find him in Wilmington again, in partnership with a Mr. Telfair, and engaged in the publication of the Republican, an influential Democratic paper. Here he continued until the year 1844, when he came to this city, and associated with Mr. David Fulton, bought out the press and material of the old Messenger office, and established the Wilmington Journal, the first number making its appearance on or about the 21st of September in that year. With this paper he retained his connection and labored with unwearied assiduity and zeal to promote its success until the 23rd of January, 1871, when he disposed of his interest to Mr. J. A. Rogelhard and embarked in a business less laborious and less congenial and thus better suited to his declining years. Among the people of Wilmington, with whom he has been so intimately associated for nearly thirty years past, he was universally esteemed; but it was only those who knew him best and understood him the most thoroughly that rightly appreciated the kindly disposition and open, generous heart of our deceased friend. He leaves a wife and nine children, several of the latter having attained to the age of maturity, to mourn their irreparable loss.

The funeral will take place from St. Thomas' (Catholic) Church this morning, at 10 o'clock, the body having been kept up to await the arrival of Rt. Rev. Bishop Gibbons, who will conduct the ceremonies.

The State Printing. The case of Theo. N. Ramsey vs. H. J. Moninger and W. M. Brown, in which plaintiff petitions for an order to restrain the Secretary of State from giving the public printing to Gov. Caldwell's appointee, Mr. Brown, and to command him to give the printing to plaintiff with whom the joint committee on printing have contracted in accordance with the Act passed at the last session of the General Assembly, was heard at Chambers, in Raleigh, by His Honor, Judge Moore. The cause was argued in *ex parte* by Messrs. Fowle, Davenport, W. H. Battle and Dapre for the plaintiff, and Major R. C. Badger for the defendant. At the conclusion of the arguments, says the report, "His Honor remarked that he would take time to consider it."

From the editorial comments of the Sentinel it would be inferred that Judge Moore has rendered his decision against Gov. Caldwell. That paper further says that Mr. Ramsey has sued Gov. Caldwell, Moninger and Brown in an action for damages in taking from him the printing.

The Goldsboro' Messenger of yesterday says: The dead body of George Boyett, (col.) aged about 18 years, was found buried near the Atlantic Railroad, about one mile from Goldsboro, on yesterday. The boy had been missed from home ever since last Wednesday. The coroner was duly notified and a jury of inquest held yesterday evening. The post mortem examination showed that seventeen buckshot had entered in the back of the boy's head. Strong circumstantial evidence before the jury led to the arrest of Stephen Barfield, the boy's step-father, who is now in jail.
