The Treaty.

Special Telegram to the Philadelphia Press: Washington, Feb. 28, 1872.

It may be safely assumed that the correspondence in progress between the Governments of the United States and England will result in the ratification of the Treaty of Commerce and Consular Rights by England and of the scheme for arbitration by the Geneva Conference. In any event, it may be most positively stated that this Government will continue to firmly insist on its rights to present the claim for indirect or consequential damages, and unless the English government recedes from the position it has taken, and agrees to submit the whole matter to honorable and impartial arbitration, all efforts on the part of the United States to secure an adjustment will be abandoned, and the subject in controversy left precisely as it stood prior to the meeting of the Joint High Commission. It is, of course, reasonable to suppose for a moment that Gladstone and the other leaders of English public opinion will recede an inch from the unfortunate position in which they have placed their government, and therefore it may be predicted that the Treaty of Washington will be nullified solely through the obstinacy and pig-headedness of our British cousins.

The Late Very Rev. H. E. Caskey.

The remains of the late Very Reverend Henry B. Caskey were entombed yesterday, and laid in state in the room in which the remains of the late Archbishop Spalding were laid. The body lies on a black catafalque, looped around with festoons of white silk. The body is dressed in his priestly vestments, and all about it is strewn with beautiful flowers, white at the head and feet are numbers of burning candles, and at the feet a vessel of holy water. His face looks almost as natural as in life. The doors were opened to the public at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and up to 7 o'clock a large number of persons had visited the remains. The doors will be again opened at half past 8 o'clock this morning to afford all who desire it an opportunity to look upon the body. The obsequies will take place at the Cathedral to-morrow morning, beginning at 9 o'clock. Rev. Father Fertilie will be celebrant at the Mass, assisted by Rev. Father Ziegler, as deacon; Rev. Father B. J. McManus, as sub-deacon, and Rev. Father McCallan, as master of ceremonies. The funeral discourse will be delivered by Right Rev. Dr. Becker, Bishop of Wilmington, Delaware.
