The Late Storm-Marine Disasters-

Reported Loss of Life. As we feared, there have been several disasters on Chesapeake Bay and other waters in this vicinity. We have received no definite intelligence from the Hatteras coast, but fear we will receive sad tidings from that quarter in a few days. We give below all the information we have gathered in relation to disasters in this vicinity: On Saturday a boat from the United States steam frigate Guerriere, at anchor off Fort Norfolk, containing nine men, was swamped while attempting to land, and the men were precipitated into the water. They clung to the boat, and were drifted ashore on Ferry Point, whence they came over to this city. In the evening they went aboard the receiving ship New Hampshire, being unable to return to their

The steamer Alpine, which plies be-tween this city and Elizabeth City, N. C., and the intermediate landings, went eshore Elizabeth river, and was wrecked-the

anchors and struck on Willoughby's Spit. She will be got off by the Baker Bros. Seven sloops, four schooners and a num-

ber of lighters dragged ashore in our harbor on Saturday. The steamer Croatan was blown from the wharf at Atlantic City, and drifted ashore on Portsmouth flats at the foot of North street.

The schooner Cornelia, Captain E. L. Harris, of Philadelphia, went ashore on the beach at the mouth of the Western Branch of the Elizabeth River during the gale Friday night. The vessel with three anchors ahead lies in two feet water (high water). The deck load and everything movable on deck was lost. The vessel is very little damaged and can he got off.
