From the Work House to the Jail.

Frank Marsden, who was sent to the Work House a lew days ago, was brought to this city yesterday and delivered to Sheriff Schenck. who committed him to the county jail. This was done, we understand, with a view to his better security, but more particularly to secure his bondsman in a previous case, for which purpose the fine imposed by the City Court in the last case against him was remitted.

Arrival of Prisoners. Sheriff McMillan, of Robeson county, arrived in this city yesterday with two prisoners in charge, one to be confined in the county jail and the other to go to the Work House. The former, a colored man by the name of John Brown, was convicted at the present term of the Superior Court, at Lumberton, of the crime of rape, but took as appeal to the Supreme Court His companion, Peter Leach; who is also colored, was convicted of largeny and tentenced to be confined in the Work House

of this county for six months.

Temperance Address. The address on the subject of Temperance, delivered at the Scamen's Bethel last evening. by Rev. A. A. Bosliamer, was well attended, not only by the members of the two temperance orders in this city, but by the public generally, including quite a number of ladies. We have heard but one opinion expressed of the address of the Ret. gentleman and that was one of extreme gratification, not only with the manner of its delivery, but with the subject matter of his discourse, which was very interesting and calculated to do good in the community.

Pop Oxendine. The case of Pop Oxendine, who has been confined in the jall of this county for some time past, came up before the Superior Court of Robeson during the present week, but no evidence being adduced to convict him of any crime, he was set at large. Poz Oxendine is a brother of Henderson Oxendine, a member of Lowrey's gang, who was executed at Lumberton during the early part of last year, and also of Calvin Oxendine, now in our jail awaiting trial for complicity in the murder of the late Sheriff King, of Robeson. "Pop," however, it is alledged, has never had any connection with the outlaws.

The Steamship Metropells. Capt. Castner, of the steamship Metropolis, reports as follows: Sailed from New York on Saturday last, at midnight. On Monday at 12 M., while off Hatteras, broke after erank pip. disabiling the vessel as far as steam was concerned entirely; the wind at the time being from the south, bore in the direction of Hampton Roads. At midnight, however, the wind changed to the northward, blowing heavily when, finding that the ship could not reach Hampton Roads, bore up again for Wilmington or the nearest port, arriving off the Bar on the 7th, at 11 o'clock A. M. At 4 P. M. received assistance from the U. S. Government steam-tug J. T. Easton, and was towed over the Bar, and was subsequently towed to the city by the steamer Waccamaw, arriving at her wharf at 9 P. M., the vessel being in good condition with the simple exception of the breaking of the crank pin. At the time of the accident the steamship San Salvador,

bound from New York to Savannah, was in company with the Metropolis. Signalized the vessel and sent report by the Captain to Savannah. In the atternoon of the same day, while making for Hampton Roads, spoke the Steamship Fanita, bound from Wilmington to New York. Sent a boat alongside with the Assistant Angineer bearing letters to New York, but the Captain of the Fanita refused to receive the bearer or his letters, alledging as his reason for the refusal that he was afraid of being turned out by the owners on his arrival at New York. Capt. Castner returns thanks to the Captain of the Steam-tug Easton for assistance rendered, and also to the officers of the Revenue Cutter W. H. Seward for assistance tendered. The Metropolis behaved well at sea, making 8 knots under sail, and part of the time as high as 9 knots an bour. It is expected that she will be ready to sail on Mon-
