Moths in Carpets. Smoke House Robbery. Some thief broke into the smoke house of Mrs. Price, on Fourth, between Princess and Chesnut streets, on Saturday night last, between the hours of 9 and 10 o'clock, and succeeded in carrying off about two hundred pounds of bacon. An entrance was effected by boring holes through a panel of the door, which was removed to admit the body of the thief.

Shooting a Hen. On Sunday afternoon, about 3 o'clock, a difficulty occurred at the shops of the Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta Railroad, between Wm. Gordon (white), watchman, and Cass Mott (colored), switch-tender, which resulted in the former shooting the latter, inflicting severe but not fatal wounds. It seems that Mott, contrary to the rules in force on Sunday, attempted to pass through the buildings, and upon being warned by Gordon that he would not be permitted to do so, took exceptions to the order and acted in a manner calculated to irritate and defy the watchman, when he drew his pistol and fired two balls at him, one passing entirely through the left leg, just below the knee, and the other passing partly through the same leg and lodging near the knee-pan. Gordon was subsequently arrested, but upon the evidence of the physician that the wounds were not dangerous, he was admitted to bail in the sum of \$300, to await an examination.

THE QUELAW. Partial Confirmation of the Killing of Boss Strong - Disappearance of the Body, &c.

From parties from Robeson county who arrived in this city yesterday, and also from information conveyed in a private letter to a gentleman of this place, we have a partial confirmation of the killing of the notorious outlaw, Boss Strong, McQueen, after shooting the outlaw, is said to have remained in the vicinity of the house about an hour, with the hope of getting an opportunity of killing Andrew Strong, but without success. He finally started for Shoe Heel for reinforcements, arriving there about 1 o'clock Saturday morning. He got a crowd together, but on account of some unavoidable delays they were unable to reach Strong's house until 10 o'clock that morning.

Upon entering the house they found Andrew Strong's wife and another woman present, but the body of the outlaw had disappeared. The women, however, were engaged in removing the stains of blood from the floor, and in reply to inquiries, said, "We had a dead man here last night, but the rest (meaning the other members of the gang) have just left with him." Of course, under the circumstances, there was no possibility of recovering the body, and the party returned to Shoe Heel.

Among those with whom we have conversed on the subject there seems to be a unanimity of opinion in reference to the alleged killing, there being but little if any doubt expressed that, although the body may not be recovered, the soul of the noted desperado and outlaw has been sent to its last account. We hope to receive still more definite intelligence to-day.

A Monument to Rev. J. L. Fritchard.

We are glad to learn that a number of ladies are engaged in the good work of raising a fund for the purpose of erecting a suitable monument over the mortal remains of the lamented minister of God, Rev. J. L. Fritchard, who sacrificed his life by his devotion to the sick and suffering of our community during the prevalence of the terrible scourge of yellow fever in this city in 1853. We have several times brought this matter to the attention of our citizens, and we are gratified to be able to announce at last that it is now in a fair way to be pushed to a successful issue. It is estimated that between \$400 and \$500 will be required for the purpose, and, through the efforts of the ladies alluded to, about \$300 of this amount has already been raised. We hope our citizens will not be backward in contributing to this worthy object. RIVER AND BAR IMPROVEMENTS.

WILMINGTON, N. C., March 11, 1872. Col. Wm. L. DeRosset, President of the Chamber of Commerce.

Sir: - The monthly visit of your Committee to the Harbor Improvements, near New Inlet, was made on Thursday last, the 7th inst.

It will be remembered, that during the past month, Cape Fear River has been visited by an extraordinary freshet, the water rising to an unusual height, so much so, that during its existence, the water at the works was not reduced at low tide, more than eighteen inches below the line of high water mark. As a matter of course, very little work could be done during this condition of affairs. Add to this, a continuance of stormy weather during nearly the whole month. One storm of great violence, which lasted for four days consecutively, the wind blowing all the while from one direction, was well calculated to result in damaging effects. Strange as it may appear however, we are pleased to say, that no damage whatever was done to any part of the work, either of the breakwater, or the bridge, or the pier, which had been planned; everything is intact, as though no storm or high tide had occurred, while there are indications of considerable damage to the exposed and unprotected parts of the beach.

The simple statement of these facts, we feel it to be the strongest commentary on our command, upon the utility and stability of the works now progressing.

Work upon the breakwater is progressing satisfactorily, under the circumstances, and considering the small amount of means allowed to progress with.

Quite an amount of foundation work has been done; although only about thirty or forty feet have been completed by the finishing superstructure. The beach in point continues to follow up the current of the main New Inlet, which now seems to take a southeasterly direction from the inner shore of Federal Point, diagonally across the inlet, outside of the outer point of Zeke's Island shore, moving in a somewhat parallel line to Smith Island beach, throwing up in its passage, a reef or line of shoal from the outer point of beach to Zeke's Island.

How this course of current (if correct) will affect the present plan of operations we are unable to say, and if we were, it would be exceeding our province to speak. If prejudicial, the Engineer in charge will very soon discover it, if he has not already done so.

There is still another matter to which we deem it proper to call the attention of the Chamber. It appears from the chart of a survey made last Summer by Captain Jenken, of the U. S. Coast Survey, and under its direction, that there then existed upon the rip across the western channel of the main outlet of the Harbor, near Fort Caswell, a line and a half (3/4) feet of draught water at low tide, the benefits of which, as yet, have not been

made available. This passage appears narrow and not exactly straight, and can only be rendered available by the addition of two or three buoys judiciously placed.

And again, we are informed (an officially of course) that the volume of water now passing the main outlet of the Harbor, being largely increased, by the construction of the breakwater near New Inlet, and taking the general direction of the Eastern, or old main ship channel on the Bald head side of the outlet, is perceptibly raising a channel through the outer bulk head on Reeper shoals, and that ten feet (10) draught can now be obtained across it at low tide. If these reports should prove true, (and we suppose the facts will soon be developed by the officers of the coast survey now at work upon this outlet), we can see no good reason, why our commerce should not have the benefit of any improvement in the navigation, and as rapidly as such improvements can be made, by having the channels properly marked by buoys.

All of which is respectfully submitted for your consideration. H. NUTT, Chairman.
