COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Extends from the Proceedings. According to previous notice the Board of County Commissioners met Monday night and resolved itself into a board of education for the county, as presided by set of General Assembly, when it was moved and seconded that A. R. Black, Esq., be appointed County Examiner for the ensuing scholastic year.

The Board of County Commissioners then met and transacted the following business: It was ordered that the petition for a bridge over Black River, at Point Caswell, be built, under the supervision of Commissioner A. R. Black, at a cost not exceeding \$3,000.

There is a bad place in the pavement on the North side of Market, between Front and Second streets, which should receive attention. Col. John A. Rowland, of Lumberton, an old and prominent citizen, died suddenly in that town yesterday morning, at 2 1/2 o'clock.

A schooner, name not reported, loaded with iron for the Wilmington, Charlotte and Kutherford Railroad, 33 days out from New York, arrived at Smithville yesterday.

Marie Disastee. Schooner Sunk—Four Men Found Clinging to Her. As the steamship Metropolis, Capt. Castner, was going down the river yesterday morning, a small schooner was discovered sunk near Big Island, with four men clinging to her. Capt. Castner immediately lowered a boat and dispatched it to the assistance of the men, who were taken off and carried to Smithville. It was ascertained that the name of the schooner was Troy, and that she was loaded with wood and peanuts. She was sunk during the prevalence of the heavy wind yesterday morning and was probably overloaded.

THE CLEAVELAND BANNER.

We learn of a gentleman from the country that the negro man who was with the team of four mules belonging to Mr. John Mintz, that were drowned in Buffalo creek about two weeks ago, was on Friday last, drowned in Broad river, ten miles southeast of this place. A Mr. Hall was also drowned at the same time and place. The two above named and a young man named Mintz got into a boat and were going down the river, when suddenly the boat was drawn into a whirlpool or suckhole, throwing them all out into the water. The young man Mintz swam to the bank, but the other two, overcome by the suction power, went down into the abyss and were drowned.
