THE ROBESON OUTLAWS. Full Particulars of the Reported Kill-"ing of Boss Strong.

[From the Lumberton Robesonian.] We are gratified to be able to announce this week that another of the Lowrey band of outlaws has probably been sent to that bourne from which no traveler ever returns. Boss Strong, one of the tiercest devils of the pack, was shot and in all probability killed Mr. Jas. McQueen, a resolute and determined young man, who had for sometime been watching the movements of the outlaws.

The circumstances, as detailed to us by Deputy Sheriff McMillan, are as follows: On Thursday night of last week, about midnight, Mr. McQueen left Shoe Heel alone, provided with rations for a day or two, and well armed with a long range rife and one or two good repeaters, and walked in the direction of Scufflstown. A short time before daylight he arrived in the neighborhood of the cabin of Andrew Strong, one of the outlaws, and approaching within two hundred yards of the but he concealed himself among the bushes, where he remained all day Friday. Late Friday evening he discovered the two brothers, Boss and Andrew Strong, approach and enter the cabin. After the outlaws had taken their supper and everything became quiet, Mr. McQueen stealthly drew near and crawled up to the door, a small opening at the bottom of the shutter technically ing at the bottom of the shutter, technically termed in log cabin parlance a cat hole, en-abled him to take a partial survey of the inte-rior. The two outlaws were reclining upon their backs on the floor, while Andrew's wife and mother were sitting smoking in the cormer. Mr. McQueen listened for some time to
the conversation that was passing between
them, which was confined to the men and
which seemed to relate mainly to complaints
of the Lowry members of the band, who the Strongs thought were not disposed to allow them a fair share of the spoils taken by the

At length, Boss drew from his pocket s small harp upon which he commenced playing a tune, and McQueen, taking advantage of the sound of the music to drown any slight noise he might make in bringing his rifle to position, threw himself flat on the ground and placing the muzzle of his gun at the small opening above described, took deliberate aim at the bare head of Boss Strong which lay at a distance of about three feet from the door, and fired. The ball took effect, and the outlaw shrugged his shoulders once or twice as if making feeble efforts to lift himself up, when he became perfectly quiet and motionless, apparently quite dead. Immediately upon the firing Andrew exclaimed: "Dar Boss, you've gone and killed yourself. I been a tellin' you about bein' so careless wid your gun." and one of the women orled: "Lord-a-massa, dat harp done bust an' killed Boss." The true impossible to draw a head on him from the

Mr. McQueen now concealed himself behind the chimney where he remained for some time hoping that Andrew would come out to dishoping that Andrew would come out to discover the source of the firing. But the trembling outlaw bravely sent his wife out to reconnoitre, who soon returned and reported no discovery. Andrew, however, still kept his retreat in the corner, and finding it impossible to draw him out, Mr. McQueen returned as last as he could to Shoe Heel to procure assistance. He could find no one, however, who was willing to accompany him back to the scene of danger, and was compelled to wait till Saturday morning before he could collect a force to return. He succeeded, however, at length in mustering a few however, at length in mustering a few men who arrived at the house of the outlaws about 10 A. M. but only to find that the same had escaped. They found in the hut only two women, the wives of Andrew Strong and H. B. Lowrey, who were busy washing the blood stains from the floor, and stated that the dead body of Boss Strong had been taken away an hour earlier by Stephen Lowrey and Andrew Strong, but in what di-rection they did not know, as they had been compelled to turn their eyes in an opposite direction and threatened with death if they looked after them, until the body had been borne quite out of sight. Deeming it useless

to make any search for the body, the party re-turned to shoe Heel, and though there seems to be no doubt that the outlaw was killed, his body will probably never be recovered. The failure to secure the body is peculiarly unfortunate, as the reward cannot be claimed until the body is "delivered to the Sheriff of the

Before leaving the house, Mr. McQueen and his party made a cursory search of the premises and found a portion of the goods taken from the store of Mr. A. H. McLeod, and also one or two articles taken from the Sheriff's office on the occasion of the recent robbery in this town.
