# KEROSENE.

A Serious and Probable Fatal Accident

from the Careless Use of Korosene. A sad and perhaps fatal accident occurred in this city yesterday morning from the careless use of kerosene oil. The victim was : young man by the name of Wm. Montross, employed at the cart house of Mr. O. M. Fillyaw, corner of Sixth and Nixon streets. I. seems that he and another man, by the name of Bloodworth, occupied rooms in the cart house. The room in which young Montross slept was a small shed attached to the cart house, which was furnished with a fire place and cooking utensils, while Bloodworth used a room in the main building. About a quarter after 6 o'clock Montross arose and proceeded to raise a fire, but finding the wood damp and not inclined to burn he procured a can of kerosene oil which was used on the premises and attempted to pour some of the oil on the wood, when the blaze flashed up to the can, which instantly exploded, throwing the burning oil over the person of the unfortunate man and setting his clothing on fire. Montross immediately ran to the room of his companion, Bloodworth, and by the exertions of the two the flames were finally extinguished. Dr. W. W. Line, who subsequently examined the injuries sustained by the young man, pronounces them very serious. Later in the day he was taken to the City Hospital, waere he will no doubt receive proper care and attention. Mr. Montross is about 21 years of age. He was formerly a resident of Brunswick sounty, but has been living in this city about twelve months.

### CITY ELECTION,

Regulations for Conducting it-Laws of December 20th, I870, and 8th Day of February, 1872.

The following is a condensation of the election laws of 1870 and 1872, made in the Mayor's office, and published by us for the information of the people at large:

1. Election to take place on the first Monday 2. Fifteen days before election the Board of Aldermen shall appoint three Fegisters and Inspectors of Election for each Ward.

3. Registers shall attend at some convenient place in their respective wards, at least eight days before election, for the purpose of registering the names of the voters in their wards, also the number of block and lot or part of lot, upon which said voter resides. Said inspectors shall also give notice in one or more newspapers of the time and place of registration and the day and place where the election shall be held.

.The qualitications of yoters are the same as voters for members of General Assembly, but every person voting must have resided ninety days within the corporate limits of the city, and have been a resident of the ward in which he votes, thirty days previous to the election. 4. Any person fraudulently voting or registering or attempting the same, shall be deemed gully of a misdemeanor, and on conviction,

shall be sentenced to imprisonment for thirty

days, and a fine of one hundred dollars. 5. On Saturday next preceding the election, ou application of any candidate for Alderman, the Mayor or acting Mayor may appoint such persons as said caudidate may designate, if Aute-Com'union 11 AM they be proper and discreet persons, to act as Exening Prayer 5 PM challengers at the polls, of which one may be allowed to attend at each voting place, he having access to the registration books.

6. The votes are by ballot, upon the cumula tive plan, each voter being allowed to place ten names repeated, or two names five times repeated, or, any other division of names he mag see fit, so it does not exceed ten names in

7 After the polls are closed, the Inspectors of election, in presence of such challengers as may choose to attend, shall proceed carefully to count the vote, carefully noting on a properly prepared list the votes—the books or pull list to be provided by the city, the votes on each ballot, as it is drawn from the box, to be recorded, each name or repetition of a name to count as one vote. Any challenger may demand to see the ballot. When through counting, and the result of the poll has been determined, it shall be announced by the inspectors, who shall forthwith certify the result on the poll list and sign the same, and any enallenger may sign the same. All ballots shall be carefully preserved, and together with poll lists shall be delivered by the Inspectors, and such challengers as attend, to the Clerk of the Board of Alderman at the City Hall who, in presence of the Inspectors and challengers shall carefully compare the poll lists, and shall declare the ten candidates receiving the greatest number of votes to be duly elected Aldermen, and the Clerk shall notify the elected candidates.

8. No person connected with the city government, or a candidate, shall be an Inspector or challenger, or shall be present at counting

Board of Education.

The County Commissioners met as a Board of Education on Monday night, when it was Ordered, That the free schools established under the law of April 12th, 1869, for the four months of the winter of 1871 and 1872 be discontinued, for want of funds for their support, and that the Clerk of this Board notify the different School Committees of the county of this order.

It was ordered that such teachers as have taught schools from March 7th to the 25th inst., luclusive, be paid the amount due them out of the State school fund now in the hands of the Treasurer of the county, and that the Chairman of the Board is authorized to draw upon the County Treasurer for the amount due such teachers when drafts are made, approved and signed by the School Committee, Upon the adjournment of the Board of Education, the County Commissioners met and considered the tax bill, but, without definite action, adjourned until Friday evening next, when it will be adopted.

A Horse Thief,

One H. J. Lanier, white, charged with stealing a horse, bridle and saddle from Mr. Joshua Cole, residing near Chinquepin, Duplin county, and who was arrested at Elizabethtown, Bladen County, some weeks ago. was in this city yesterday, in charge of an offi cer, en route for Duplin. He was lodged in the Guard House for safe-keeping until the train left. We learn that the evidence against Lanier, who is a mere youth, is very conclusive. The horse, &c., have been recovered.
