A piece of codfish-skin, the size of a penny, washed thoroughly and dropped in the boiling coffee, will make it perfectly clear, and requires less coffee and less boiling than when egg is used. A very economical way of settling coffee with eggs, is to brown a pound at once; immediately upon taking it from the oven, break on the hot coffee one egg, stir rapidly until every kernel becomes moistened with the egg; the heat of the coffee will soon dry it, when it is ready for use.

The Flying Leap-A Sketch from Life on the Cape Fear.

A day or two since, while the steamer Waccamaw was engaged in towing the Rebecca Clude up to this city, a rather remarkable incident occurred. A light house boat, containing six men, was attached to the stern of the Clyde for the purpose of being towed up, and when off against Big Island, a few miles below the city, a U. S. Mall boat, containing two men, came up alongside with the intention of securing like assistance in reaching the city.
