COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Extracts from the Proceedings. The Board met Friday night, when the following among other business was transacted: The Committee on cost of Medicines and medical attention during the year 1871 report that the cost, as furnished from the records of this Board, is as follows:

Further time taken for consideration of the matter before concluding upon best manner of supplying the desired aid. The Committee on Poor House having reported that it is necessary to furnish further supplies to Poor House, after consideration it was decided to supply the following articles:

It was ordered that the sum of one hundred dollars be paid to Commissioner A. B. Black for amount of expense of building a new bridge on Riley's Creek. It was ordered that the Township lists of taxes of 1869, 1870 or 1871 be permitted to be used by the different Township Trustees for the purpose of giving them information regarding the valuation of property and that the Trustees be held responsible for the safe return of same to the Clerk of this Board.

It was ordered that W. T. Banzerman be appointed Clerk of Holden Township, and that he be notified by the Clerk of this Board to give bond and qualify. It was ordered that the Committee on repairs to jail be granted further time to prepare their report and that meantime the holes in the third story be stopped up. It was ordered that Larkins & Sessoms be granted license to retail spirituous liquors in the town of Lillington.

It was ordered that the lunatic woman named Julia Bordeaux, complained of by Mr. J. W. Williams, be sent to the Poor House. It was ordered that Commissioner A. B. Black be authorized to examine into the complaint made against the former Clerk and Board of Trustees of Holly Township by Geo. Page and report to this Board at the next meeting. Adjourned to meet Friday night, April 13th.

Grier will fill the pulpit of the 1st Presbyterian Church this morning. Messrs. Dudley & Ellis advise that they are now selling the cheapest calf-skin boots, sewed and pegged, ever offered in this city. Only two convicts sent to the County Work House during the week ending yesterday, and one prisoner turned over to the Sheriff for trial. Thanks to Mr. R. L. Harris, of the Front Street News Depot, for copies of the N. Y. Ledger, Chimney Corner and Clipper for the current week. He keeps everything in the way of reading matter. Calvin Oxendine will be taken to Smithville to-morrow. He is charged with complicity in the murder of the late Sheriff King, of Robeson, and other crimes. Marsden Bellamy, Esq., appears for the defence. The Republican City Convention meets at the City Hall to-morrow afternoon, at 2 o'clock, for the purpose of nominating candidates for Aldermen. A lively time is expected. A small colored child, living on Chesnut, between Third and Fourth streets, had its arm nearly cut off close to the elbow, yesterday, by an axe in the hands of another colored child. The cutting was accidental. The Rev. Mr. Grier, who preaches in the First Presbyterian Church this morning, was Pastor of the church for a number of years before the war, and is therefore no stranger to our citizens. Arrest of an Alleged Forger. A white man by the name of F. G. Kidder alias E. G. K. Ticknor, was arrested in this city yesterday, by Officer Wilson, of the police force, charged with forging a check for \$75 on the Freedman's Savings Bank, of Richmond, Va., and with being a fugitive from justice. The forgerly alluded to was committed nearly twelve months ago. At that time Mr. V. D. Macomber, now Cashier of the Freedman's Savings Bank of this city, was residing in Richmond, acting as Assistant Cashier of the Freedman's Savings Bank of that city, and was familiar with the circumstances attending the forgerly. Immediately after committing the crime Kidder fled the city and no clue could be obtained as to his whereabouts. Yesterday, however, Mr. Macomber got sight of the individual, knew him as the guilty party and had him arrested. He then telegraphed the facts to Richmond and a reply was received requesting that the prisoner be held to await a requisition. The party arrested has been traveling through this part of the State for some time past as an Agent for Wheeler & Wilson's Sewing Machines, under the name of Ticknor, his principal headquarters, as we infer from his cards, which he distributed very lavishly, being Goldsboro, Wilson, Tarboro, Enfield and Halifax. He has been lodged in the Guard House for safe keeping.

A Tremendous Excitement. Decidedly the most exciting event of the week transpired at the foot of Market street yesterday afternoon. The occasion of the excitement was a matter trifling in itself, but had the effect of drawing together a large crowd and creating any amount of merriment. It was nothing more than an effort by certain parties to get a couple of obstinate mules on board of the ferry flat for the purpose of transporting them to the West side of the river. They used force, persuasion, strategy and every other means known to "love or war," but to no purpose. Finally, after consuming about an hour and a half in the vain effort to get them on the flat the mules were proclaimed the conquerors and were taken away. In the midst of the excitement and mirth occasioned by the obstinate brutes an incident occurred which intensified the feeling of good humor which prevailed among the crowd. A "colored gentleman" from the rural districts, who had a cart at the foot of the Market, had fastened his dog by a short line to the wheel of his vehicle. Living on the opposite side of the river, he suddenly got in the notion to go over in the flat then in the dock, and forgetting that his dog was tied to the wheel of his cart, gave whip to his animal, and the shouts of the spectators first called his attention to the fact that his dog was following the evolutions of the wheel with the certain prospect of soon becoming a defunct member of the great family of dogs.

Marine Disaster.

A dispatch from Boston, dated yesterday, states that the Bark Willy and Emory, from this port for Queenstown, with a cargo of rosin, struck on the Great Rip, Nantucket, on Thursday night, and bilged. The steamer Island Home went to her assistance and stripped off her sails and rigging. The crew were saved and landed at Nantucket. A small part of her cargo may be saved. To Test Coffee.
