

Sunday's Telegrams Condensed.

Fred Douglas, his son and Mr. Downing, negroes, left Washington to-day for the Colored Convention at New Orleans.

A prominent Illinois politician who is now in St. Louis, states that Senator Trumbull has written to his brother-in-law, Dr. Jaynes, in Springfield, Ill., and in the letter, fully commends the liberal movement and expresses his opinion that the nominee of the Cincinnati Convention will be next President.

The annual conference of the Mormon Church, held at Salt Lake City, began this morning. There was a great crowd present. The speakers gloried in the progress of the Mormon church, which could not be retarded by the combined efforts of all existing powers. They said that every President, Judge, officer and priest who had been against the Mormons fell by the chastening hand of God.

At Cincinnati the committee of arrangements for the two day conventions have appointed a committee to receive, and to present, as a committee of reception for delegates and visitors. Half fare arrangements have been made with nearly all the railroads. The park commissioners have granted the use of Exposition Hall.

St. Louis announces that 200 delegates from that city will attend the reunion of the Reform Mass Convention.

**From Pennsylvania.**  
 SCRANTON, April 8.  
 W. W. Ketchum persists in the Republican candidature for Pennsylvania.

**From Michigan.**  
 DETROIT, April 8.  
 Lake St. Clair is again open.

**From New York.**  
 NEW YORK, April 8.  
 Proceedings have been commenced against the Tenth National Bank before the Federal Commissioners Court for locking up \$750,000 worth of legal tenders to affect the prices of stocks.

It is reported that Gould has sold his interest in the Grand Opera House to Mrs. Fisher. The German Internationalists have seceded from the regular organization and formed a new federal council. The proceedings yesterday give signs of trouble brewing.

The lock up of money with which the Tenth National Bank is charged was caused by an attempt of Henry N. Smith, Jay Gould and other Wall Street men to purchase the stock of the gentlemen being on the bear side altogether they withdrew from circulation, without a moment's warning, about \$4,750,000 in legal tenders. In consequence of the closeness of money they induced their great embarrassment Saturday at the Cora Exchange. A telegram has been sent to Secretary Boutwell requesting him to relieve the money market by loaning a portion of the large reserve in the Treasury.

It is said that a number of the Wall Street operators will be arrested to-day.

**From Mexico.**  
 CITY OF MEXICO, April 8.  
 The fate of the revolution in the States of Yucatan and Tabasco is undecided. Of the Mexican steamer Tabasco has gone to Progreso to protect the American steamer City of Mexico.

The Mexican authorities at Vera Cruz await the arrival of the steamer to convey troops to Matamoros to attack the revolutionists in the rear.

**From Washington.**  
 WASHINGTON, April 8.  
**SENATE.**—No business of importance transacted.

**HOUSE.**—Harris, of Va., introduced a bill refunding to postmasters of the South stamps and other property taken from them or destroyed during the rebellion. The bill is still filibustering over the civil rights bill fought as usual. It finally came up on a square vote for a third reading, which may be regarded as a test vote. Result—yeas 100; nays 77. A motion is pending to table the bill, but the expiration of the morning hour checked proceedings and the bill goes over to next Monday.

**Foreign News.**  
 LONDON, April 8.  
 The city of Antioch, in Syria, has been earthquake and half of it totally destroyed. Fifteen hundred persons were killed.

The fleet of this morning says a rumor prevailed last night that an important telegram had been received at the Foreign Office from the government of the United States. This dispatch, it was reported, indicated that there was a prospect of the differences between England and America, growing out of the claim for consequential damages, being settled in a manner satisfactory to both nations.

**TONIGHT REPORTS.**

**FROM WASHINGTON.**  
 WASHINGTON, April 8.  
**MISCELLANEOUS.**  
 The National Democratic Committee meets here about the 25th inst. to adopt plans to secure an immediate and thorough reconstruction of the Democratic party for the Presidential campaign.

The U. S. steamer Lackawanna has been ordered to Hong Kong.

Judge Lochrane, of Georgia, passed through here to-day en route for New York.

The Supreme Court to-day decided in favor of Judge Fisher in the Bradley case. Bradley was acquitted from Judge Fisher's office, the close of the Barrett trial some years ago.

The committee having charge of the memorial services in honor of Prof. Morse, to be held in the House of Representatives Tuesday evening the 18th inst., held a full meeting to-day and report next completion all the arrangements which will make the event of great interest. Leading members of both houses of Congress will deliver short addresses and Oliver Wendell Holmes will probably read a poem written expressly for the occasion. Letters have been addressed to the mayors of cities requesting them to call public meetings the same night, and a plan has been perfected to hold similar meetings throughout the world and communicate with the meeting here by telegraph. It was resolved to extend the following invitations: "To His Excellency, the Governor—The National Telegraph Monument Association has appointed you one of the Vice Presidents on the occasion of the memorial service in honor of Samuel F. B. Morse, to be held in the House of Representatives on Tuesday evening, April 18th. It is further agreed to invite the widow and family of the late Professor to be present on the occasion and become the guests of the nation. Rev. Dr. Adams, pastor of the Professor, is invited to open the proceedings with prayer. Admission to the building to be by card only.

**SENATE.**—The bill holding the Missouri river at Brownville was passed.

Several private bills for property taken during the war were passed, including Mrs. Barrett's House Bill, of Tennessee, and Milton Best, of Kentucky, also Horace Tyler, of New Orleans, \$40,000 in full compensation for work done at the mouth of the Mississippi, and the bill paying Mrs. John Minor Davis nearly \$2,000 was passed.

The bill against straw bids for mail contracts was passed.

The bill relieving citizens of London county, Va., for cattle taken was passed.

The bill relieving Powell & Dickinson, of Knoxville, paying them \$60,000, was also passed.

The bill for the relief of Joseph Segar was postponed.

**HOUSE.**—The resolution directing the

Committee on Banking and Currency to investigate the charges against National Banks of a conspiracy to lock up the currency, with power to send for persons and papers, was passed.

The appropriation bill was resumed and discussed till adjournment.

**From New York.**  
 NEW YORK, April 8.  
 In the Supreme Court to-day a motion was made to adjourn the case of Samuel Samuels against Wm. C. Bryant, of the Evening Post for libel, until the arrival of Bryant from Mexico. The motion was argued, but declined to be granted.

A large eight hour meeting was held here to-day. The resolutions which they want by legislation what could be obtained by revolutionary means.

George Thompson and Henry Overton were fatally burned last night at a drunken carousal in a tenement house on Leonard street.

Sixty-two writs of habeas corpus were brought before the Supreme Court this morning in the cases of prisoners who it is alleged were illegally sentenced by the Court of special sessions. Action was postponed till Wednesday, when the Court of Appeals on this matter can be obtained.

Subsequently there was 153 additional writs issued February Wednesday.

Dr. Joseph Woodhull, husband of Victoria Woodhull, is dead. A coroner's jury is investigating the circumstances.

**From Florida.**  
 TALLAHASSEE, April 8.  
 Governor Reed issued a proclamation, this morning, which is attested by the great seal of the State, claiming that the action of the Senate in adjourning without giving him trial operated as his discharge and acquittal from the charges preferred against him.

The proclamation then recites that Samuel T. De, regardless of the high and sacred rights of the people, and of his (Reed's) power and authority, continues to make removals from and appointments to office, and therefore he issues it with full power to protect the public credit, preserve public property, and prevent the collection of oppressive taxes and other purposes evil. He then proceeds to proclaim his authority and power in the performance of all chief executive duties in this State.

The acts and doings of Samuel T. Day, since the setting and doings of the Assembly, Senate and High Court of Impeachment, are without authority of law, and I forbid him, and all persons acting under and by his authority, from exercising any official power or authority under peril of the law; and I forbid all obedience to them and command full obedience to the lawful authority of the duly elected Chief Magistrate of the State.

Rescinding this attempt, in accordance with the functions he claims, made several appointments and removals from office.

**From South Carolina.**  
 CHARLESTON, April 8.  
 The Ku Klux trials will be resumed here tomorrow before the U. S. Court, Judge Bond presiding.

A large number of prisoners and witnesses in these cases have been brought here from the interior counties and remain in military custody.

**CABLE DISPATCHES.**  
 PORT AU PRINCE, April 8.  
 A Haytian General while on his way to prison at Saint Marie took refuge in the American Consul's house and was protected by the Consul for some time but was finally released. The matter will be settled by higher authorities.

Thirty men from Monte Christo landed in a schooner at Cape Haytien and seized the arsenal and held it 24 hours, but were finally driven to the woods. Several of the party were killed.

**Notice to Mariners.**  
 Captain Walden, of steamer Glaucia, says: Masters of vessels passing over Nantuxet Shoals, should not place too much reliance in the lightships buoys in that location, as they have been much damaged during the past winter. Some of the buoys have been gone for a long time—the Pollock Rip and Shoverton lightship so often change their position that they are useless as range in passing the light. Heavy anchors should be furnished the Light Ship, and more care exercised by the Lightship Inspectors to cause the several lightships to maintain permanent positions. Owing to changes in the channels some additional buoys are needed; they have been asked for, but as yet no attention has been paid to the request. The utmost care should be exercised in maintaining the lightships and buoys in proper and permanent positions, and we earnestly urge the Lightship Inspectors to redouble vigilance in the maintenance of these aids to navigation in this most dangerous locality.
