The Campaign Opened—A Radical Row at the Court House Last Night.
A meeting of the Republican delegates of the several Wards was held at the Court House last night for the purpose of appointing three delegates for the Township at large to the County Convention which meets to day. Denard Ramsey, George W. Price, Jr., and Owen Burney were appointed.

The session was an unusual stormy one and several personal collisions occurred. The most exciting rencontre of the evening, however, took place in the Court House passage, after the meeting adjourned, between James Heaton, late member of the Legislature from this county, and Duncan Holmes, colored, who is an aspirant for the Sheriffship. The word went forth to let them fight it out, and at it they went with an earnestness which would have seemed to indicate that one or both would come out of the fight rather the worse for wear. Friends of the parties finally interposed and they were separated. The result of the fight we did not ascertain, further than the fact that Holmes claimed to have lost some of his superabundance of flesh by a bite from his adversary. The fight being concluded, Holmes drew off in good order and took a position in the street in front of the Court House, where, surrounded by a number of his friends, he proceeded to deliver himself in his usual happy style, and if "cuss words" could have demolished his late adversary, he would have been annihilated in less time than it takes to say "Jack Robinson."

To-day, in the Convention, which meets at the City Hall at 12 o'clock, the battle will probably be renewed.

An Act Concerning the Taxation of Banks.
As a matter of interest to many of our readers we publish the following Act, passed by the last Legislature, in reference to the taxation on Banks:

Sec. 1. The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact: That so much of any charter of incorporation or other acts passed by the General Assembly at any session, or heretofore, as provides for any other rate or mode of taxation than that required by the provisions of an act entitled, "An Act to raise Revenue," ratified the day of January, A. D. 1872, be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. That this Act shall take effect from its ratification.
