MADRID, April 12. An armed band of Republicans have appeared at Vandrell, seventeen miles from Sarramossa. .A party of Carlists, two hundred and fifty in number, stapped a railroad train, yesterday, and plundered it of goods, but did not molest the pass ngers. They also cut telegraph wires and communication with Barcelona is now interrupted.

Gov. Gerona telegraphs that the troops are operating against insurgents in Barcelona, but rity suspended, but will soon be resumed. the result is unknown.

The iron workers in the city of Barcelona have struck for higher wages. The landed proprietors of the province have organized parties to pursue marauders who infest the country. Fights have already taken place with robbers and men have been killed on both sides.

Official reports from Catalonia say that the troops are active all along the frontier. When bands of Carlists appear troops are immediate ly sent in pursuit, and in the quiet districts where there is danger of insurrection, flying columns scour the country.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, April 13.

The Secretary of the Treasury has prepared and submitted to the committee of Ways and Means a bill abolishing the office of Collectors and Assessors of internal revenue, and providing for not more than fifty Supervisors, who shall perform all the duties of Collectors. The bill proceeds upon the assumption that all taxes are to be removed except those collected by stamps.

meeting is as follows:

"List evening the first gun of the coming Presidential campaign was fired in New York under imposing circumstances. The great tide of national reform which has swelled and surged for months part through the length and preadth of the land with irresistible volume, rose then to its highest point and swept everything before it. The announcement that several of the ablest and most honorable U. S. Senators would expound the principles of this movement in favor of sound statesmanship and agai st the abase of good government, attracted an immense concourse of people to hear their eloquent words in behalf of the new retorm programme. Never since the Cooper Institute was built has such a tremendous au dience filled the large hall of that building. In the square and on the sidewalk in front of the Institute, a dease crowd congregated at an early nour and strove, long after it was announced that the hall was filed, to gain an entrance within. The firing of cannon and ex plosion of fireworks attracted still greater numbers to join the multitude already collected, but they came only to be disappointed. At 7:30 o'clock the police refused to admit more persons within the doorway. The doorways, corridors and stairways were then jammed to suffication, the outlets to the main hall being blockaded, while the half itself was a dense, excited, cheering mass of struggling humanity. " To estimate the size of the crowd would

be idle; but it is enough to say there were thousands present, and almost as many were turned away without galuing admission, the hall being utterly inadequate for the occasion and it is evident that if the needs of the Reformers during the coming campaign, are to be consulted, we must have another far larger meeting to in New York city, to contain them when they meet in council. The crowd was as respectable as it was large, and compremised many of our most prominent citizens, they were well dressed and well to do, including merchants and professional men, mechanics and politicians Democrats and Republicans, Germans and Americans, without regard to opinion or condition. It was an andiand intelligence of the city and was truly representative in character. The hall was decorated with the American flag and a number of small steamers, while the Brass Band played appropriate airs at litervals. The platform was not less crowded than the auditorium and many noted persons being noticeable. The meeting opened promptly and then selected fred erick Conkling, as Chalrman, which position be filled with excellent judgment and good sense, pacifying the audience when distur bances occurred, owing to the efforts of the crowd, outside to force their way into the room and preserving order in spite of the many difficulties under which he iabored.

"The resolutions were then read by the Sec-retary, and were brief, weighty and emphatic. "Senator frumbull was next introduced and was received with tumultugus cheering, which, however, was surpassed by the enthu siastic applause from all sides when Horace Greeley appeared on the platform and wok a seat near the speakers stand. Trumbull spoke with great energy and fire, and not only elec-trified but also instructed his audience by his eloquence and masterly logic. His assaults on the centralizing tendencies of the present administration were bailed with indignant cheers, and he astonished his hearers by show ing them the despotism which threatens the sately of the republic. He upheld in unqualitied language the true democratic doctrine of States' rights, and while denouncing the retels as traitors he yet said they were never thieves. He warned his audience against the dangers of a centralized authority, which has already established in different States of the Union tribunals for the adjudication of property and lives of the people subject to its own control, and said this power was in great danger of

"Senator Sehurz next took the stand and ref Trumbull as the lion of the occasion and april 12-t

leading light of the reform movement. His speech was eagerly anticipated and attracted many persons expressly to hear it. He spoke calmly and yet carneatly, using very full notes. His manner was not full of the and fury, signifying nothing, but clear, logical and convincing. His dispassionate arguments did not carry away the feelings of his audience, but they appealed to their reason and held their attention closely. His voice many loud and clear through the vaulted hall and throughout the packed yet silent throng like notes of clarthe packed yet silent throng like notes of clar-lon. The audience seemed spellbound and only at intervals recove ed themselves sufficiently to applaud. This, however, they did repeatedly and with vior, showing that the eloquence of the orator was furly appreciated. Each word was received with attention, and every strong point made against the adminis-tration was fully appreciated. As to the speech itself we can only refer to the full report annexed, which can alone do justice to its acumen, close reasoning, wit and other admirable qualities."
