OPERA HOUSE Sir:-The regular monthly visit of your Committee to the public works near New Inlet for the improvement of Cape Fear Har-

bor was made on Wednesday, the 10th instant. Since their last visit on the 7th of March. about 180 feet of the breakwater has been completed with the finishing superstructure, aggregating one thousand, four hundred and twenty feet (1420) as now complete. The foundation cribs across the last slew in the line of old stone work, have been placed in position and filled with stone to the line of

The sand does not seem to come up against the work so readily as at first, although the shoals are forming in front in a very autisfactory manuer, and will, no doubt, soon be brought up.

The curr nt of the main Inlet, alluded to mour last report as taking a South Eastwardly trection in front of Zeke's Island, appears mo e defined, and is evidently pressing to its injury, the point, or turn of the beach.

This point is much exposed to the wind, as well as to this new current, and seems to require attention to prevent serious injury. The beach is filling out in some parts of it; ing session, but the afternoon deliberations particularly is it perceptible that the shore line is extending outward, where the catch-sand fences have been placed, and grass

The grass is now beginning to display its value; that which was planted last fall and winter, and covered by the blowing sand, is already bursting out above ground, and will soon be out of danger, giving promise of much usefulness.

No injury is perceptible from the serere southeast gale of the 8th and 9th insts. The U S. coast survey party, under command of Lieut. Vinal, having completed their survey of the lower harborand outlet, we were kindly ermitted to examine their map of soundings, from which we perceive that a new channel has been discovered, or recently opened, perfectly straight from the harbor into the ocean, seven Lundred and fitty feet (750) wide, the eastern line of which bearing due south west from the point of Cape Creek. This channel sustains a clear draught throughout its entire length and breadth of fifteen to twenty feet at mean low tide, exc. pt a bulkhead of one third to half a mile, upon which there is not less than nine feet with two small lumps of eight and eight and a half feet. This bulkhead appearing to be a remnant of Keepe shoals not yet washed away, but rapidly wasting. In addition to this new feature in our naviga ion, the pilots now report an improved channel through the western bar outlet, with nine feet at dead low tide upon the Rip, which is more than they have acknowledged for the

past fifteen years.

We are pleased to record these facts as the happy results of the system of improvements now being prosecuted near New Inlet, in con tracting the outlet of water at that point, and increasing the volume passing out of this, the main outlet, and which induces the belief that still greater results may be expected as the works at New Inlet progress.

To secure the full benefit of these improvements however, by a prompt land judicious co operation with nature, in utilizing these results, it may, and no doubt, will involve the necessity for a greater expenditure of money during the coming fiscal year, than was estiwork, which fact it is noped, will be brought forcibly to the attention of Congress by our Representatives.

On the 2nd of this month, the President of the Chamber was advised by your Committee of the existence of this new channel, suggesting an application to the Light-House Board for its being properly marked by bouys, as its early use would iscilitate its improvement. The application was promptly made through our Collector, D. Rumley, Esq., who has been anserwed in effect, that the subject shall receive mmediate attention. Respectfully,


