The Oldest Mason. Mr. Joseph Arrey, a well known citizen of Fayetteville, died on the 4th inst., aged 83 years. Mr. Arrey was a Mason of 58 years standing, having become member of the Order in 1818.

The Proposed Railroad. The friends of the movement for the building of the proposed railroad from this city to Wrightsville Sound have selected next week, it being court week, as the most proper time for holding a meeting to consult about the matter and to take the necessary steps for securing the success of the enterprise.

Pilots Suspended. In one of two pilots of St. Helena and Port Royal, S. C., who have been recently suspended for incompetency or neglect, we recognize the name of Joseph A. Dupont, formerly of this place, and well known from his connection with Cuba affairs.

The Nominees. The Republican State Convention at Raleigh adjourned yesterday, after a rather inharmonious session, judging from the P. r. s. telegram which we publish in another column. The following comprise the additional nominees so far as we have heard at the present writing: C. H. Brocken, of Wayne, for Lieutenant Governor; W. H. Howerton, of Rowan, for Secretary of State; T. L. Hargrove, of Granville, for Attorney General, and David H. Jenkins, for Treasurer.

Bishop Gibbons. On Sunday last, as we learn from the Richmond papers, the Roman Catholic Cathedral of that city was filled—galleries and aisles—with a congregation assembled to hear a lecture on charity by Bishop Gibbons, the proceeds of the same to be placed in the hands of the Society of St. Vincent De Paul for distribution among the poor and needy, without distinction of religious denomination.

We notice from the Petersburg papers that the Chief of Police of that city has received a letter from Miss host of the Purcell House, of this city, enclosing a bill for \$37.50, against Wm. Strong, alleged to have run away from that house. This is the individual who was here for several weeks past soliciting orders for advertising cards, adorned with attractive pictures of eminent actresses, and who finally sopped, leaving his hotel and other bills unpaid. The police of Petersburg and other cities are on the lookout for the swindler.

From the Charlotte Road. President Martin, who has just returned from a brief tour of inspection on the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad, informs us that the work is somewhat retarded by the lack of labor. Everybody is crazy on the subject of getting turpentine, and it is a difficult matter to secure a sufficient number of workmen. The turpentine mania is raging fearfully, a number of stills being put up beyond Lileville. Everything looks flourishing along the line of the road. There was quite a heavy frost Tuesday night, but very little damage ensued to the growing crops. The farmers are in fine spirits under the prospect of good crops and a plenty of fruit the present season.
