COUNTY CONVENTION. Meeting of the Conservatives and Democrats of New Hanover Last Night.

In pursuance to a call from the County Executive Committee, the Conservatives and Democrats of New Hanover assembled at the Court House last night. Mr. Douglas McMillan was called to the Chair and Messrs. Owen Fennell, Jr., and Jas. L. Boatwright were requested to act as Secretaries.

On motion of Maj. J. A. Engelhard, a Committee of five was appointed by the Chairman to draft resolutions to govern the action of the Convention, viz: Maj. J. A. Engelhard, Capt. W. A. Cumming, Hon. O. P. Meares, Dr. J. F. Simpson, M. C. Collins, Esq. The Committee subsequently presented the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Recognizing the great crisis in our civil affairs now near at hand, and desiring to organize to give aid to our patriotic, political friends throughout the State, we, a portion of the Conservative Democratic citizens of New Hanover do resolve

1st. That we approve of the Convention to be held in Greensboro on the 1st day of May next, and that all the members of the party present are hereby appointed delegates to represent New Hanover in said Convention.

2d. That the chairman also appoint fifty delegates, to represent this county in the District Convention to nominate a candidate for Congress, and we respectfully suggest to the Executive Committee of this county, that the most convenient point for holding the Convention.

3d. That we heartily endorse the proposed amendments to the State Constitution.

4th. That Reform and Retrenchment being necessary for the well being of the citizens of the whole Union, we hail with pleasure the uprising of the people of the North, without distinction of party, against the tyranny and corruption of the present administration.

5th. That Hon. A. M. Waddell, our representative in Congress, is entitled to our thanks for his recent able and manly vindication of his constituents and his State, and for the ability, dignity and zeal with which he has represented the interests of his district, and we cordially recommend his re-nomination.

6th. That Maj. C. W. McClammy and Capt. S. A. Ashe, our Senator and Representative in the last General Assembly, by their close attention to business, by their labors in behalf of our local interests and by their unwavering devotion to principle and duty, are entitled to the thanks of the people of this county; we part with one with regret, and hope to reward the other by still greater manifestations of our confidence and esteem.

The chairman was permitted to appoint 50 delegates to represent this county in the District Convention at his leisure.

On motion of Mr. J. C. Wood it was resolved that the chairman be authorized to re-assemble this Convention whenever in his opinion he may see fit.

Judge O. P. Meares, being called upon, addressed the Convention at considerable length and in his usual able manner on the political condition of the State and country. Several other gentlemen were called upon and expressed their determination to do their full duty in the coming campaign, after which the meeting adjourned.
