GREENSBORO, May 2d.

The ticket was completed to-day, as follows: Lieutenant-Governor, John Hughes, of Craven; Treasurer, John W. Graham, of Orange; Attorney-General, W. M. Shipp, of Mecklenburg; Secretary of State, J. A. Womack, of Chatham; Auditor, J. C. Leventhorpe, of Caldwell; Superintendent of Public Instruction, Nereus Mendenhall, of Guilford; Superintendent of Public Works, J. H. Separk, of Wake.

The pith of the platform unanimously adopted is contained in the following resolution: Resolved, That the time has arrived when it becomes the duty of all patriots, without distinction of party, to unite in an honest effort to restore Constitutional Government on an equal and moderate system of taxation, economy in expenditures, honesty among the officials and impartial amnesty, and thus secure the permanent peace and prosperity of our common country.

Evening Session. The following gentlemen were chosen as the Central Executive Committee: Hon. D. M. Barringer, C. M. Buebee, J. Q. Decartier, A. B. Haywood, O. P. Meares, W. H. Jones, J. J. Davis, J. J. Litchford, General W. A. Cox.

The election of Presidential electors and representation was left with the Executive Committee. The speakers during the morning session were Judge Merrimon, Maj. John Hughes, Hon. J. M. Leach, Gen. VANCE MAKES THE GREAT SPEECH OF THE DAY.

MEMBERS OF THE PRESS IN ATTENDANCE.

The Manifest Popularity of the Nominee for Governor.

MERRIMON AND VICTORY.

[Special Correspondence of the Morning Star.] GREENSBORO, N. C., May 1.

Your correspondent writes late at night from a cozy room in the magnificent Benbow Hotel. A great crowd fill the hall and the streets, while from my window scores of brilliant lights flash across the public squares of the city in front. Speaking is going on at the Grand Wigwag where the Convention was held to-day. The speakers are announcing this afternoon are entertaining the crowd down there. But your correspondent must make out his notes taken to-day, and not speak of what is going on elsewhere than where he is to-night.

At 11 o'clock the talented orator, Hon. Samuel F. Carey, of Ohio, addressed a wide, surging audience from the balcony of the Benbow House. He made a most timely and appropriate speech, clearly showing the gross corruptions and monstrous, outrageous tyranny of the party in power in the country. Gen. Carey paid North Carolina a noble tribute for the personal purity and greatness of her public men. Some of his flights of eloquence were brilliant and even thrilling and powerful.

At 12 M., the different delegations being seated in the new and commodious "Wigwag" prepared for the occasion. Gen. Daniel M. Barringer, of the Executive Committee, in a few appropriate remarks called the Convention to order, and nominated for Temporary President, Col. Thomas C. Fuller, of Fayetteville, who in a few brief, pointed but eloquent words announced the purpose and object of the Convention. It is not necessary for us to tell those who know this truly gifted gentleman that he filled the position of Temporary President with great credit to himself and honor to the body itself. On motion of Gen. D. M. Barringer a committee on permanent organization was appointed, consisting of two from each Congressional District. Gen. T. H. Clingman being called out made a fine speech. When the roll of counties was called, it was ascertained that eighty-five out of ninety-two counties were represented. There have seldom been sent delegations to State Conventions so able, dignified and truly representative as these. The members of the Press and the large number of prominent gentlemen present were invited to seats on the stand.
