THE GREENSBORG CONVENTION. ANOTHER GLORIOUS DAY

THE ACCEPTANCE OF THE NOMI-NEES.

BRILLIANT AND ENTHUSIASTIC SPEECHES.

The Fighting Trim of the Party Better than Ever Before.

[Special Correspondence of the Morning Star. GREENSBORO, N. C., May 2d, 1872.

To-day has been another glorious. day in Greensboro, and another glorious epoch in North Carolina history.

The spacious and beautifully decorated Wigworm was crowded as on yesterday, and the glorious stars and stripes blazoned over with the grand old legend of the Roman Emperor, "In hoc signo Vinces" graced an assembly as proud and high-minded, as bright folds over.

The President called the Convention to order at 10 o'clock. The Committee to wait on Gov. Merrimon reported his acceptance, but all speeches were deferred until the ticket could be completed. This was effected by electing those truly representative gentlemen to the hereinafter named positions of honor: Maj. John Hughes, of Craven, Lieutenant-Governor, Mej. J. W. Dunham, of Wilson, Cols. Withers, Gilmer and Allen were also in nomination and received handsome acknowlments of their faithful services to the party .-Maj. John W. Graham, of Orange, was elected Treasurer. His competitors were K. P. Battle, Esq., of Wake, and Dr. Worth, of Randolph, Col. Clark moved the nomination of Judge Shipp by acclamation for Attorney-General, which was carried. The contest for Secretary of State was between R. M. Furman. of the Louisburg Courier, Andrew Syme of the Sentinel, J. A. Womack, of Chatham, Nick L. ANOTHER MURDER IN ROBESON.

MORVILLE.

The Outlaws Again on the War Path-Cold-Blooded Murder of Col. Frank Wishart-His Body is Found Riddled With Balls.

By a letter received by a gentleman of this city yesterday, which was confirmed by passengers on the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad, yesterday afternoon, we have the sad intelligence of the death of Col. F. M. Wishart, of Robeson county, who was murdered by the outlaws on Thursday morning. We give the particulars of this bloody tragedy as far as they have come to hand. It seems that the outlaws sent a message to Col. Wishart in the early part of last week, endeavoring to make an appointment to meet him on Tuesday, but for some cause or other he declined to accede to their request. They subsequently met him at Moss Neck and requested a private interview with him, behind Tate, of Caldwell, Nickolson, of Iredell, and a certain building there, which he granted, on contestants for Superintendent of Public alone, and that Stephen Lowrey should keep Instruction, viz: Messrs. D. H. Hill, of at a distance. He was informed by Andrew Strong that he and the other outlaws were tired of their present mode of life and were desirous of agreeing upon p some terms of surrender. With this object in view, lhey wished to meet him (Col. Wishart) privately and freely and fully discuss the matter. Finally, at parting, Strong intimated that they should send for him in a few days and urged him, when requested to meet them, to obey

Thursday morning Capt. Wishart received another message from the outlaws, stating that they had arranged for the proposed interview to take place that morning at a point about three quarters of a mile from Lebanon Church. In response to this request he left Shoe Heel immediately, going as it afterwards proved, into the very jaws of death. Thursday evening his body was found at the spot where the interview was proposed to take place, which, by the way, is near the point where Stephen Davis was killed. His wounds were four in number-one in the head, two in the body and one in the leg-and from their appearance it would seem that he and the outlaws were in close quarters, probably engaged in conversation, when the cowardly, treacherous fiends selzed their advantage and made a simultaneous and murderous assault ppon their brave and chivalrous, but, as the event has proved, too confiding entagonist.

Poor Wishart! His sudden and untimely death will be sincerely regretted by a large circle of friends in Robeson and adjoining counties; but who will avenge him? He leaves a wife and three children who reside at Shoe Heel, where the unfortunate husband and father was engaged in merchandizing.

Petrified Bones.
