—Judge Merrimon and Major Hughes will address the people of Wayne at Goldsboro on Wednesday, June 5th.

—On account of the scarcity of flowers, memorial services at Goldsboro have been postponed until the 17th inst.

—The county Convention for the purpose of nominating county candidates for Wayne is to be held on the 2nd Saturday in June next.

—The Conservatives of Robeson and Columbus will meet at Fair Bluff on the 1st Thursday in June to nominate a candidate for Senator from that District.

—The Mouser, a humorous paper published at Greensboro, learns that sometime last week a young man by the name of William Wrenn committed suicide in Rockingham county—the result of a love scrap.

—At the municipal election in the city of Wadesboro, on Monday, H. A. Crawford was elected Mayor, and J. B. Burns, Geo. W. Willoughby, and Edmond Hutchison Commissioners. So we learn from the Argus.

—The Goldsboro Messenger says: The Rev. Edward R. Rich, of the Diocese of Maryland, has accepted the invitation of the vestry of St. Paul's Church, at Clinton, to take charge of that parish, and expects to enter upon his duties on Trinity Sunday, the 26th of the present month.

—The Goldsboro Messenger says: We are glad to see the masons and workmen at work laying the foundation for the new hotel. The building is to be 124x124 and three stories high. It will contain six commodious stores, offices, barbershop, &c., on the ground floor, and about 75 rooms of different sizes in the upper stories. The cost of the building will exceed \$36,000. Messrs. L. W. Humphrey & Co. hope to have the hotel completed in time for the Fair, which is to be held, commencing October 23rd.

—The Raleigh, Era says: "About noon, the 2nd of May, C. N. Keith, Deputy Marshal, attempted to arrest Erwin Duyck, near Hiram Proffitt's, in Yancey county, with a United States warrant, when Duyck refused to be arrested and drew a pistol and shot Deputy Marshal Keith through the bowels and run. So far he has made his escape. A Doctor was sent for at once, but Mr. H. Proffitt, who went for the Doctor, says he did not think Marshal Keith could live until Dr. Houston got there." Duyck was also seriously wounded in the neck.

WHEREAS the card in yesterday's issue of the STAR and Journal, purporting to emanate from Mr. F. Newman, and over his name, in relation to his having been a candidate for the position of City Alderman, has a tendency to place me somewhat in a false position with the Germans of this city, as well as with the members of the Republican party, I deem an explanation of my action in the matter essentially necessary.

Mr. Newman was requested by me on last Wednesday, the 1st inst., to allow his name to be brought before the people as an independent candidate, on an independent ticket. My reasons for requesting Mr. Newman to allow his name to be used were these: first, that I had no objection to the course he pursued in that the German voters of this city (numbering over 150) with the assistance of a few English and Scotch voters, could elect him. The plan was by me proposed to several Germans, who entered their names in the proposed ticket, and they all agreed that he was the most popular man for them (the Germans) to support, and the Germans, with exceptions, agreed to support him. That they did not do so was my own fault.

Second: That Mr. Newman was acknowledged to be a good Republican, and a strong supporter of the position I not only secured three Germans upon the Board, (thus giving them their just dues) but succeeded in electing 7 Republicans, deeming it my duty as a Republican, and not being a party to the compromise made, to defeat the Democratic party, and the Germans, with exceptions, do so as a Republican. Being an enemy to them politically, they could expect nothing less from me.

In justice to Mr. Newman, I request his Republican friends to suspend judgment in relation to him, as I have good reasons to believe that the Republican, notwithstanding the publication of the card referred to, may 10-11 W. H. GERKEN.
