New Car Coupling.

We yesterday examined a self-acting car coupling, for which a patent has within a few days been issued to Mr. C. S. Servoss, of this city. Two important improvements are combined in this patent which seem to us of great advantage to railroad men and passengers. The first is perfect security to life in coupling an entire train, and, second, the entire separation of the train in the event of an accident to any car of the train, or a broken rail, from which accidents three-fourths of all the loss of life on our railroads occur. The style of the coupling is similar to those in ordinary use and the facility with which it may be substituted for the old link couplings with but little cost will, we believe, commend itself to all our railroad officers and be brought into general use. One other advantage over any self-coupling that we have noticed is that it may not may be used where the train is fitted the ughous with this improvement, but it may also be used with any old coupling

with equal facility. To test the value of this improvement, by permission of Col. Fremont, Chief Engineer and Superintendent of the Wilmington, Charlotte & Butherford Railroad, the coupling was some four months ago attached to two freight cars on that road and has been in constant use since with results fully satisfactory as to durability and self-acting in coupling. By the good management of the road, fortunately, no accident has occurred to test its value should a car jump the track, but the arrangement to accomplish this purpose is so simple it seems almost impossible that it should hardly ever fail to accomplish its purpose. We congratulate Mr. Servoss that he has invented so valuable an improvement toward safety on our railroads and trust that his patent may prove valuable to him. --
