Commerce: SIR: The monthly visit of your Committee to the harbor improvements near New Inlet,

was made on Saturday, the 4th inst., on board the steaming James T. Easton, Capt. Leary, in company with Mr. Benton and others, Major Griswold being indisposed.

Since our last visit, on the 10th of April, about eighty feet of the break water has been fluished, making fifteen hundred (1500) feet now complete, and two hundred and twenty (220) feet more nearly finished, which takes the work to the last unbroken line of old stone work, to finish which, is a small job comparatively, and we hope to be able to say in our June report that the breakwater is complete to the northern end of the old stone work, a distance of over two thousand (2,000) feet, to the southern line of the wide, shallow open-ing south of Zeke's Island, the work of crossing which has already commenced by the placing of several foundation cribs. The beach formation in front of the breakwater continues to follow the work, but not

so rapidly, or so closely as at first. This rare and wonderful fish or animal was hooked and captured on the blackfish ground near the mouth of the river, on the 9th of May inst., by Capt. John R. Chadwick, of the tug Brandt, and is now in "possession fof J. G. Bulckin, Esq., on Water street, preserved in alcohol for inspection by the curious. It has but seven arms of eight to twelve inches in length (one having been cut off or destroyed in some way). This rare creature has been found on "the coasts of North Wales, and Devonshire, and likewise in Tropical waters, where it is regarded a formidable enemy from the enormous size it attains, having arms of five to fifteen feet in length.

It has also, we believe, been found upon the Northern Pacific coast of America, but never before this, to our knowledge, has if been found upon the Atlantic coasts of the United States.
