A Contury Plant.

The following letter from a lady in Jacksonville, Florida, written to a lady friend in this city, will be found interesting to our readers : JACKSONVILLE, FLA., May 12th.

There was a Century Plant here that created quite a sensation on account of its commencing to bloom. It only blooms once in a hundred years. This plant was growing here in a gentleman's garden and was never thought anything of until recently, when it commenced throwing up a long stalk or shoot; this stalk grew six inches every night and was twenty feet high. He expects to be in Boston in time for the great Jubilee. On Sunday night before the Steamer left, a gentle man from the St. James' Hotel offered Mr. D. one thousand dollars in each for his share or the standard to the standard of three thousand dollars for the whole plant; but they would not sell. They expect the plant to bloom in about three weeks.

Small-Pox at Smithville.

To those living beyond our city we will state that Smithville is thirty miles below Wilmington; and while we do not auticipate a visit from Small-pox here, it is well enough to adopt the suggestions of Dr. Curtis as precautionary

SMITHVILLE, May 26th, 1872. Wm. H. Bernard, Editor of Star :-

DEAR SIR:-There are now two cases of small-pox at the Quarantine Hospitel, which have been taken from the Schr. Ida Richardson It is quite probable that other cases will at pear. All possible precautions are being taken and the vessel will be retained at quarantine

as long as seems necessary.

I hope the citizens of Wilmington will not neglect the measure of safety which they hold in their own hands, viz: vaccination, and that the authorities of the city will provide the safeguard free of expense for the poor.

Fire in Robeson County.

The dwelling house of Mrs. Mary Ann Mc-Lean, residing about three-quarters of a mile from Shoe Heel, Robeson county, was discovered to be on fire yesterday morning, about 4 o'clock, and before anything could be done in the way of extinguishing the flames it was entirely consumed. The building was quite a large one, being two-stories high and containing eight rooms. The fire was evidently the work of an incendiary, as it originated on the outside of the dining room, situated about ten feet from the main building, with which it was connected by a piazza. The family saved but a small portion of their furniture and clothing, including a few beds. Mrs. McLean estimates her loss at from \$1,500 to \$2,000, upon which there was no insurance. The loss falls heavily upon the lady in question, as we learn that she will not be able to replace it. No clue has as yet been obtained as to the perpetrators of the terrible deed.

The New Hose Bridge Tested. The new hose bridge, invented by Mr. L. W. Hodges of this city, was tested at the Engine House of the Howard Relief F. E. Co. yesterday afternoon, the Chief Engineer and other officials being present. The bridge was placed in position over the hose, which was stretched across the street, and the steamer "Adrian, weighing about 5,000 pounds, was driven rapidly across it, the result being entirely satisfactory to all who witnessed the test. We have no doubt that the Board of Aldermen, at their next meeting, will order these bridges to be used hereafter by the Fire Department.

A Collision. While the little steam tug Tiago was engaged in towing the Steamship Lucille from the wharf of the Green Swamp Company, on the West side of the Cape Fear, to the wharf of the People's Steamboat Company, yesterday afternoon, the Lucille accidentally run into the steamer North State, lying at the latter wharf, and slightly damaged her upper works. At the time of the accident an attempt was being made to dock the Lucille, when the hawser got loose and consequently there was no means of checking her. She struck the North State about midships.
