Marshal's Office.

CITY OF WILMINGTON, N. C.,) MAY 28th, 1872.

THE attention of citizens is called to the following Health Ordinance. It is of the greatest importance to every resident of Wilmington that the city should be kept thoroughly policed, and it is to be hoped that every person will report to this office any violations of the Health Regulations, or places that need disinfectants. It is the intention of the authorities to have the city kept clean and healthy. To do this the Ordinance must be strictly enforced.

By order of the Mayor, W. P. CANADAY, City Marshal.

SECTION TENTH.—HEALTH

The Marshal shall be the General Health Officer of the city, and it shall be his duty, at all times, and more especially during the months of June, July, August and September, to observe, and he shall give it in charge of all the members of the police to observe and report to him, the sanitary condition of all parts of the city.

All cellars, excavations, or open spaces, under any building in which water at any time stagnates or rises, or which are damp, and in which foul and unwholesome air is generated or found, shall, upen the notification and requirement of the Mayor, be filled up by the owners thereof to the level of the street or alley adjoining thereto, with sand or gravel, or some other imperishable substance. And all lots on which water remains and stagnates, or which are generally wet and damp, and all lots sunken below the level of the next adjacent street or alley, and from which there is no suitable drain or gutter, of a permanent character, sufficient readily to vent water from the same, shall, upon like notification and requirement, be filled up by the owners in the manner aforesaid, or so drained by gutters, culverts or drains as to be kept free from

water or dampness. Every person failing to comply with the foregoing provisions of this section, after notification and requirement from the Mayor, shall forfeit and pay twenty dollars for each and every day of such failure; and, moreover, shall pay all the costs and expenses of filling up or draing as aforesaid, which, upon such failure, the Mayor shall cause to be done at the expense of the city.

All occupants of houses with cellars, and if there be no occupants, then the owners, shall cause all dirt, filth and rubbish to be removed from such cellars, and the same to be cleansed and whitewashed, whenever and as often as they shall be notified and required by the Mayor so to do.

All occupants, and if there be no occupants, then the owners, of all stores, shops and warehouses, shall remove therefrom all fish. beef, pork, hides, or other matter or articles, whatsoever, which may be putrid, or offensive to the smell, or may tend to corrupt the atmosphere, and shall ventilate and cleanse their building whenever notified and required by the Mayor.

All persons keeping one or more cows, horses or hogs, within the limits of the city, shall keep their stables, yards, pens or enclosures, in which such animals shall usually stand or be, dry and thoroughly cleansed; and, once injevery fortnight, they shall remove the filth and offal from the same beyond the limits of the city.

No person shall permit any putrid, noisome or offensive matter or substance of any kind, to remain or be upon the lot or premises occupied by him, but shall immediately remove the same beyond the limits of the city.

No owner of any lot shall suffer any James town or other weeds to grow thereon; but all lots shall be kept free and clear therefrom by

No person shall place, deposit, throw, pour or convey by any drain or gutter, into or upon any street, alley, wharf, or other public place, within the city, any dead animal, offal, garbage, filth, manure, feculent matter, foul or putrid water or other fluid, or any matter offensive to the smell or injurious to health : nor shall any person keep, or suffer to remain, any of the articles or things above mentioned, in or upon his yard or lot more than twentyfour hours.

Every person violating any of the provisions of the seven last preceding paragraphs of this section, shall forfeit and pay twenty dollars.


