The New York Herald, in announcing the death of Mr. Bennett, says: Five years ago Mr. Bennett entirely withdrew from the active management of the Herald, and although feeble in frame, his general health had been remarkably good, while his fine intellect remained unimpaired, and his interest in events of the day continued unabated up to the moment of his fatal illness. About 1½ o'clock last Saturday afternoon, Mr. Bennett suffered a slight convulsive attack, accompanied by epileptic symptoms, but not sufficiently marked or violent as to excite apprehension of immediate danger. At 11/4 o'clock last Sunday morning the attack was repeated, with greater severity, and from that time the end became evident, although the constant attendance of Doctors Cyccarini, Hammond and Lusk ensured the exhaustion of all means within the reach of buman efforts to avert the fatal result. On Tuesday last, at the request of Mr. Bennett, Archbishop McCloskey visited his bedside and administered to him the sacraments of the church. When the last hour arrived, he sank to sleep in death calmly and peacefully, and bis soul passed away without a struggle. Mr. Bennett was in the seventy-seventh year of his age.
