There has been considerable activity among the various Republican aspirants for political bonors in this county for the past week or two. There seems to be quite a number who are willing so sacrifice the pleasures and quiet ude of private life for the honors and emolu ments of office and no little warmth is beginning to be displayed between the leaders of the rival factions.

On Saturday last, in Cape Fear township, the various aspirants for the first time showed their hands. Owen Burney, colored, and W. S. Benjamin, white, announced themselves as candidates for the nomination for the Legislature; Schenck, Manning and Duncan Holmes for the Sheriffalty, and Joseph E. Sampson, Fred. Howe and J. C. Hill for Register of Deeds. Lr. Scott, the "wheel horse" of Cape Fear township, did not announce his predilec tions. In fact, it is said he is fluttering in the breeze, undecided which point of the compass to settle upon. It is known that he expects an office of some sort, but not having committed himself as yet his triends are in a quandary us to whether it is the Legislature, the Sheriff alty or Register of Deeds, though it is the gen eral impression that he has his eye on the former position. It is understood, we learn, that Price is to have the nomination for the Senate, and Robert Sweat is prominently spoken of for Coroner, though they have not yet publiely announced themselves.

Fine for Non-Attendance.

The following is an extract from the general ordinance of the city in reference to finding members of the Board of Aldermen for non-attendance upon the meeting of the same :

If, for any cause, the Aldermen shall not convene on the day aforesaid, they shall convene as soon thereafter as may be practicable, and take and subscribe to the oath aforesaid. At their first meeting as aforesaid, they shall fix their regular stated days of meeting for the year, which shall be as often at least as once n every month, and special meetings shall be held on the call of the Mayor or any three Aldermen, and of every such meeting, when called by the Mayor or any three Aldermen, the Aldermen shall be notified in writing; and if any Alderman shall fail to attend a regular stated meeting, or any called meeting, of which he shall have notice as aforesaid, unless pre-vented by such cause as shall be satisfactory to the Board, and shall be entered on the minutes, he shall forfeit and pay, for the use of the City, the sum of ten dollars.


