Goldsboro, N. C., June 6th, 1872. Your correspondent is on the wing to-night and tired, and therefore feels little of the caccethes scribendi possessing his soul, but he will give you a few hurried notes of political move ments in the Secondand Fourth Congressional Districts, together with some miscellaneous

I passed through this place Wednesday on my way Raleighward, to attend the sittings of the District Convention. The Convention of the Second District was in session at the time, but having to take the train at 4:30, I did not attend. The District Convention of the Fourth Congressional District was called to order at 10 o'clock by the Chairman of the Executive Committee, H. A. London, Esq., who nominated for Temporary President Charles M. Cooke, Esq., of Franklin, and the editors of the District papers present for Secretaries. A Committee on Permanent Organization

was appointed, who reported the following in a few minutes: President-Hon. Daniel M. 
