Clear weather prevail very generally on Wednesday north and west of the Ohio Valley, with light to fresh westerly to northerly winds, and over the Southern States with light to fresh southerly to westerly winds. Clear and partially cloudy weather over the southern portions of the Middle and New England States, and increasing cloudiness and possibly freshening weather over the northern portion with light to fresh westerly to southerly winds. Disagreeable winds are not anticipated.
